County Taxpayers Receive Deceptive Letters Regarding Senior Citizen Tax Freezes

(McKinney, TX) - Many Collin County taxpayers received letters from a source calling itself"State and County Tax Reduction Exemption Processing Center" asking them to mail a completed check and processing. fee to receive a tax freeze, which could save "thousands" in taxes. In these letters, taxpayers are told. that it "appears" they may be eligible for a tax freeze on the taxes they pay to the school district. It also speaks of a "new elderly freeze" and states that according to government records, the taxpayer has not filed for the fiecze.

According to Kenneth Maun, County Tax Assessor Collector, these letters are deceptive and may be discarded upon receipt. He said that once a taxpayer who in 65 or older has applied for the

Over-Age-65 tax exemption; the tax freeze on the school district taxes is automatic. He continued by saying that there is no need for a separate application for the tax freeze. The application filed for the Over-Age-65 exemption is adequate. Many of the taxpayers calling about the letter discovered that they already have the tax freeze, despite what the letter may have indicated.

Mr. Maun also asked that anyone who is eligible for the Over-Age-65 property tax exemption and has not filed to please contact the Property Tax Office at 972-547-5020 (Metro 972-424-1460 ext. 5020) or the Collin Central Appraisal District at 972-578-5200. There is no fee to apply for this exemption, and either office may assist in completing the application.

In some ways, Williams has played the dutiful daughter game, insisting over the years whenever she was contacted for interviews that Thurmond was just a close friend of the family.

She explains in a Washington Post article, "I did not want anybody to know I had an illegitimate father. I want to finally answer all of these questions that have been following me for 50 or 60 years." She said her story is a part of history much like the Sally Hemmings relationship with founding father Thomas Jefferson.

William's attorney, Frank R. Wheaton of Los Angeles, said Mrs. Williams was not seeking to challenge the wishes of the late senator with regard to his estate. We are not looking for money. We are merely seeking closure by way of the truth for Essie Mae Williams."

City Council member Jackie Feagin said the initial intent of the ordinance review was to address the problem of people who interfere with traffic at intersections, but other council members recommended extending it to neighborhood solicitation.

The ordinance also would require information on adults who might accompany Girl Scouts when they go door-to-door selling cookies or hold booth sales at retail centers, which would cost the city to conduct background checks

There is also concern that it would affect school organizations bands. and like church organizations.

City Attorney Charles Hinton said he has since been directed by the city council to redtaft the existing ordinance with one part pertaining to street solicitation and the other pertaining to door-to-door solicitation.

City of Richardson

The City of Richardson City Council passed Ordinance 3441-A, creating a rental registration program to help ensure that tenants of rental houses and duplexes are provided with dwellings that meet minimum safety, health, fire and zoning standards. Owners of rental property are required to complete an initial registration prior to January 1, 2004. Owners will also be requited to renew the registration on an annual basis determined by the geographical location of their property. Although there is no fee to register; there is a penalty (max \$2,000) for failure to register the property or for providing false information.

Condominiums are currently not included in the rental registration program.

The Fundamentals of **Financial Aid for College**

(Loan Alternatives)

Some of you may already have been accepted to the college of your dreams. But there may be a bigger challenge than just getting accepted, and that is deciding how you are going to pay for your dream education. Paying for school doesn't always have to be a problem. There are many ways to offset the cost of a college education-your first step is to fill out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

Scholarships and Grants

Scholarships and grants are awarded by a variety of organizations, and do not have to be paid back. They may, however, require you to keep a certain GPA; if it is an athletic scholarship, you must remain academically eligible.

Most schools offer scholarships based on academic merit and/or financial need. You can also check with religious organizations, foundations, labor unions, businesses, or town and city groups for based on scholarships achievement, ethnicity, hobbies, or talents.

Another possibility is the military. All branches of the Armed Forces offer the Reserve Officer's Training Corps (ROTC), a federal merit-based scholarship program that will pay for tuition, fees, books, and provide you with a monthly your spouse are veterans, or Express software.

are a dependent of a veteran, veterans' educational benefits may be available as well; check with your local Veterans' Affairs office.

Grants are financial aid awards that do not need to be repaid. For example, the Pell Grant is the largest federal grant program, awarding an average of \$2,400.

Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants

FSEOGs are federally funded grants available based on financial need. While FSEOG and Pell Grants are available for undergraduate students, they're not an option for graduate school.

Work-Study

Work-Study is a government program based on your financial aid eligibility. The programs count as financial aid when the college financial aid office arranges the employment. Your earnings are then excluded from the expected family contribution equation.

The Financial Aid Process

If you apply using the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) on the Web or FAFSA Express, your data will be processed by the processing system. You'll receive a Student Aid Report (SAR) in the mail approximately three weeks after you mail in the signature page that can be printed from allowance. If either you or the Web or from FAFSA

The FAFSA form is required for all students who seek consideration for federal financial aid programs. Before completing, compile all tax information-for yourself and parents or spouse.

For most federal student aid programs, the FAFSA is the only form you'll need to file. To receive a Federal Family Education Loan, (FFEL), Stafford Loan, or a Direct or FFEL Plus Loan, you'll have to complete additional forms. Submit the form no sooner than January 1 of your senior year, but as quickly as possible thereafter. Aid is distributed on a first-come, first-served basis.

In about a month, you'll receive your Student Aid Report (SAR), which you should check for accuracy. If there are no problems, the SAR will report your Expected Family Contribution (EFC), the number used to determine your eligibility for federal student aid. The results will also be sent to the schools you list on your application.

If it has been more than four weeks since you submitted your application and you haven't received your SAR, you can check on your application by contacting the Federal Student Aid Information Center at (800) 4-FED-AID or TTY (800) 730-8913, or visit www.fafsa.ed.gov.

FAFSA on the Web is a free U.S. Department of Education Web site where you can submit the FAFSA online.

Wouldn't that be great? I would rejoice

to the heavens if that show hosts who talk a good happens. As far as I know, there is only one person in this category who, with the support of his family, financially supports Anderson's efforts on a regular basis.

I want this to be an informative and timely article on a little-known tax shelter and how we can save on taxes and do something for ourselves simultaneously. I want it to be a solicitation to you in support of an organization that is working on your behalf. I know my passion is showing but believe me, it is an honest and sincere passion. It is a passion for those who are working to empower Black people - the same way other groups in this country have empowered themselves.

Please don't allow Claud Anderson to disappear from the national scene without having completed his mission of helping to set us on a solid collective economic foundation. Christian Women's Job Corps Loses Leader But Keeps Focus

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (BP)-Through Christian Women's Job Corps, a ministry of Woman's Missionary Union, countless women in need have discovered direction and hope for their lives. For the past 10 years, Trudy Johnson, CWJC director for national WMU, has coordinated efforts to advance this ministry across the United States and help equip women for life and employment.

CWJC was born out of a vision of WMU leadership beginning in 1994 and subsequently designed by a CWJC task force. It was established as a ministry of WMU in 1996. In six short years, Christian Women's Job Corps, which started with six pilot sites, has grown to approximately 130 sites across 21 states.

Carol Causey, director of WMU's missions resource center, said, "WMU is excited about CW]C's growth potential as we take steps to provide accessible training to more mentors and site coordinators and produce resources for the advancement of the ministry."

The two key elements that make Christian Women's Job Corps

successful are that each participant is paired one-on-one with a mentor for encouragement and accountability and that each participant is expected to participate in a weekly Bible study to either begin or grow in her relationship with the Lord. CWJC makes a longterm commitment to each participant to assist her until she reaches her goals. The WMU Foundation holds

several endowments for the advancement of CWJC, which all have grown over the years. The CWJC Special Fund supports current operating financial needs at various sites; the CWJC Endowment Fund awards financial support to sites for the expansion of current ministries; and the Sybil Bentley Dove Endowment supports an award given annually to a CWJC participant who has completed the program and desires to advance herself through skills training, academic development, and faith in Christ.
