Like what you're getting? Then keep doing what you're doing.

Once again (sounds like a broken record) Cincinnati is in the national and international news for being the city where a Black man cannot stand on the street, sit in his car, hold a brick, or go to the store for a soft drink without getting killed by police officers. Of course I am generalizing only because, unless you have been in a "spider hole" for the pass couple of years, you know what I am talking about.

Cincinnati and many of its citizens, both Black and White, continue to amaze me. I am amazed at the apathy; I am amazed at the lukewarm resistance; I am amazed at the fear; and I amazed at the lack of righteous indignation at what has to be one of the worst cities in America for police/community relations and economic disparity.

Cincinnati is ground zero, and the world awaits our decision on how we will deal with the latest in a long line of debacles that plague this town. No need to recap the things of the past; you already know our history. Suffice to say that just eight years ago Cincinnati was named the Nation's "Most Livable" city. What that term "most livable" means is certainly open for debate, but imagine what cople around the world think as look at Cincinnati now and see that yet another Black man has been killed by the police.

What happened to Cincinnati? I say nothing happened. Things have been this way for quite some time, it's just that the cover was finally pulled off Cincinnati when Timothy Thomas was killed. Just

read some of the writings of Carter G. Woodson and you will see what I mean. In one article titled, "Negroes of Cincinnati Prior to [the] Civil War," Woodson wrote, "In 1807 ... the legislature enacted another measure providing that no Negro should be permitted to settle in Ohio unless he could within twenty days give bonds to the amount of \$500.00, guaranteeing his good behavior and support. Woodson went on to write, "They (Black people) were not wanted in this city but were tolerated as a negligible factor."

Wendell P. Dabney, publisher newspaper entrepreneur who lived in Cincinnati, wrote a book in 1926 titled, Cincinnati's Colored Citizens." Read what he said about his hometown. In describing what took place in 1862 during "The Siege of Cincinnati," Dabney wrote, "The colored men were roughly handled by the Irish police. From hotels and barber shops, in the midst of their labors, these helpless people were pounced upon and often bareheaded and in shirtsleeves ... at the point of the bayonet, and gathered in vacant yards and guarded." Dabney also described several in Cincinnati during "riots" which thousands of Black people were killed by "angry white folks." were run out of town and others

2003 State of the City Address

Touting a Plano that is stable and strong, Mayor Pat Evans presented the City's 2003 State of the City Address at a Plano Chamber of Commerce Luncheon, held at Plano Centre, December 12.

Plano's Director Economic Development, Sally Bane, and Plano City Manager, Thomas H. Muehlenbeck, joined Mayor Evans as she presented the reflection of a city on the way up from the bleak economy of the past two years.

Bane cited the expansion new economic developments in Plano during 2003, including the addition of Southwest Corporate Federal Credit Union's 100,000 sq. ft headquarter facility in Legacy, which will bring over 200 jobs into Plano, as well as adding nearly \$15 million to Plano's tax rolls.

Bane also stressed that maintaining businesses operating in Plano is as business. She noted the retention of Advanced Neuromodulation Systems, a company that designs, manufactures and markets implantable pain devices, projected to add \$24

million to Plano's tax rolls transportation systems through an expanded facility.

Muehlenbeck cited several reasons for Plano's success, saying that the city has a solid financial balance sheet, boasting a valuation in excess of \$20 billion, including over 65,000 housing units and over 14 million square feet of retail space.

"We are rated 'AAA' by not one, not two, but by three bond rating companies. That reflects a very strong tax base financial strong management by the City Council," said Muehlenbeck.

Mayor Evans noted the success of DART Rail, the revitalization of Downtown Plano and the upturn in the economy and its impact on local business as high points for 2003.

And for 2004, Evans said an eagerly anticipated Federal Court will be making its home in Plano. "This is going to be a great service to our citizens," said Evans. "No longer are you going to have to make trips to Sherman if you're on jury duty or trials. And, it's going important as attracting new to be a new focus for economic development in the City."

Chris Rock - The Black Ambition Tour - Live at NextStage, January 17, 8:00 pm



Although Chris Rock has legions of fans many consider Rocks' humour to be politically incorrect and abusive - but this is believed to have stemmed from his experiences as a child. He was born in South Carolina, and at the age of six he moved to the notorious Bedford-Stuyvesant, which is renowned for high levels interviews that although he grew up in Bed-Stuy, he came from one of the nicer (and peaceful) blocks within the area. Chris attended an all white American school where he experienced a great deal of racism and was unfortunately beaten my many of the children. Despite being against violence Chris did defend himself.

Rocks' comic Chris inspiration came from such geniuses as Richard Pryor, Eddie Murphy, Steve Martin

He later secured a part on Saturday Night Live where he introduced his brand of humour. His reasons for leaving - where that he felt he was typecast as the only black character on the show and was unable to pursue any other activities; stand-up or film.

1991 proved to be an eventful year for Chris Rock, he received appraisal for his role as 'Pookie' in the gritty Mario Van Peebles' film New Jack City. Two years later Chris was back doing what he does best - comedy. He landed a role in Keenan Ivory Wayans' cult show -In Living Color, but unfortunately the show was cancelled a few

episodes later. The same year, of two parent families, minimum Chris Rock showcased his versatile talents by co-writing, producing and starring in the hilarious CB4 (a spoof about the hip-hop world).

After having received little success for his work on television, Chris began to realise he needed to take bigger chances, and work on his stand-up routines. He made his humour hard-edged and based his routines on sensitive issues such as black on black crime, the decline

wage and Mayor Marion Barry.

In 1997 Chris Rock had well and truly arrived - he won two Emmys' for his comedy special Bring the pain and a Grammy for Roll with the new. 1999 also saw him winning a Grammy for the excellent comedy album Bigger and Blacker. Chris Rock's analyses of topical events, fast paced quips and cool persona has made him one America's finest comedians.

Today, Chris Rocks popularity seems to be ever increasing, from voicing the puppet of Li'l Penny Hardaway (for Nike) to 1-800-COLLECT. He has also appeared in numerous movies including; Doctor Dolittle, Lethal Weapon 4, Dogma and Spike Lees' Bamboozled.

With his career growing stronger it is evident that Chris Rock is here and here to stay for



The Negro in Cincinnata, written by Frank Quillan, who was working on his Ph.D. at the University of Michigan in 1910. The Quillan discument was the result of a study of the status of the Negro in the life of Cinemnatic prepared under the direction of the Department of History at the University of Michigan.

The arricle begins with a quote from Samuel J. Tilden, Democratic candidate for presidency in 187% who called the entire state of Ohio a "dead" nigger state." After citing several discriminatory practices against Blacks in Cincinnati. Quillan poses the question, "What are the causes for this strong prejudice in Cincinnati? Among the seven reasons he gives is this (ine) "When a Negro commits a crime the newspapers always emphasize his race connection by such headlines as 'A Big Black Burley Brute of a Negro' does such and such, and the whole race gets a share of the blame, while if the crime is committed by a white man the race is not mentioned, and the individual gets the blame.

Nathaniel Jones has been demonized and described in the same manner, even being called a "deadly weapon" by the mayor of Cincinnati simply because of his weight. Mumia's BND scenario is not so outlandish now, is it?

So it's plam to see that very little has changed in Cincinnati when it comes to how Black tolks are treated and mistreated by some police officers. Why haven't things changed? Because we, Black folks, have not changed our response to these kinds of acts. We have marched, demonstrated, gone to jail, and we have had too many "race commissions" and "race dialogues" to list in this article. What should we do now, now after 40 years of marching and protesting, now after 250 years of the same mistreatment? Do you think there may just be an economic answer somewhere out there that

we could use? One thing I do know We will keep on getting what we've always gotten if we keep on doing what we've always done.



The demand is also driven by workers' often-stated desire to "be who they are" at work and their commitment to snare their faith with others - an integral component of evangelism. Many people want to practice their faith every day, not only on the designated Sabbath day. Some companies help by establishing serenity rooms - dedicated spaces that employees use for prayer or personal reflection - and affinity groups, which allow employees to practice their religion with their

"Corporate chaplains, Jesus as a leadership model, biblical stories as a

source for employee development, being a family-friendly employer. employee prayer groups, faith-based email networks - these are clear signs of a growing openness to the expression of personal religious beliefs at work," says Theodore Kinni, business writer and author of the "Across The Board"

Spirituality is a broad concept defining the need to find one's higher purpose and align one's life with it. Religion - the set of personal religious beliefs that constitute a person's faith provides that purpose in many people's

DIVERSITY DRIVING FAITH MOVEMENT

Another contributing factor to the corporate movement toward faith is the concept of diversity, the recognition of the value to be gained by tapping into people's differences to create a more productive, creative workplace. Today, diversity is the umbrella under which most manifestations of faith at work are categorized. As more companies embrace diversity initiatives, more workers feel welcome to express their faith on the job. Being a faith-friendly employer is a natural follow-on to

Some industries, particularly those working to overcome customer mistrust, such as financial services, might find religiosity a welcome employee characteristic. "Just in the last three years in my business - where some of the unethical practices of corporate America have been uncovered and the distrust of some of the financial markets has come to the fore - having demonstrable ethical values has become even more important," says Linda Stirling, a San Diego-based investment adviser for Merrill Lynch and an active participant in the Bible-based Horizon Christian Fellowship.

THE THREE FACETS OF CORPORATE FAITH

Affinity groups are the most obvious manifestation of faith at work. These groups are similar to the many groups that have formed among employees who share racial, ethnic, and other commonalities. Some companies have e-mail networks that encourage members to pray for the leadership of the company in their dealing with business and social issues.

workplace is the people leading the movement - not CEOs, for the most part - but second-level managers, operational managers, and executives at semi-autonomous branches. Middle managers seem to be embracing the faith movement for their own needs and motivations as well as for helping other workers


