Rep. Eddie Bernice Johnson Among House Members Arrested At Sudan Embassy

Seven members of the Congressional Black Caucus, including Congresswoman Eddie Bernice Johnson were arrested at the Embassy of Sudan Tuesday, after protesting over atrocities in the Darfur region of the wartorn nation.

"We will not tolerate genocide," said Rep. Mel Watt, D-N.C., the caucus chairman. " ... We are saying to Sudan this has got to stop."

The seven members were hauled off in Secret Service cars after receiving three warnings that they were violating the law by blocking the entrance to an embassy. They faced \$50 fines and were expected to be released after booking.



Through The Eyes Of Our Children" **Photojournalism Exhibit Reception at DMA**

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Last month was the warmest April on record for the United States. Ever. Well, at least since record keeping began for temperatures, which is 1895. According to the National Climatic Data Center, the average temperature for the 48 contiguous states was 4.5 degrees Fahrenheit above normal for the month. Worldwide, April was above normal, but only the seventh warmest month ever. Texas and Oklahoma both had their hottest April of all time. Time Magazine ran a cover story last month warning us that the Earth's climate is at a tipping point. And nearly every winter, I find myself remarking to my friends how the winters seem to be getting warmer and warmer. Did Dallas even get any snow last winter?

So with all these obvious signs of the warming of the planet, why aren't we more alarmed? Part of the answer lies in how the issue of global warming is being politicized.

Those on the far right in America take great pleasure in trivializing the data from scientists all over the globe that tell us the planet is getting warmer. They ridicule the "liberal media" for working us all into a frenzy over global warming the same way the local tv news scares us during May sweeps with stories about roaches in restaurants, the bird flu and whatever chemicals happen to be floating in our drinking water. The critics question the scientists, and point out conflicting data from other scientifstudies. The Bush ic Administration has been against doing anything about global warming from its onset, remember how they refused to sign the Kyoto Treaty?

The problem is that type of thinking is short-sighted denial and it doesn't take a rocket sciThe Politicizing Of Global Warming

entist or climatologist to understand why. Seismic activity is on the rise, drought is devastating more and more areas, and it is getting warmer.

If you want to understand an objection to nearly any argument, follow the money-it usually sets the agenda. The Bush Administration's refusal to sign the Kyoto Treaty on the environment? Hard to sign a treaty on saving the environment when you're in bed with Exxon Mobil and other world-wide oil conglomerates. Those scientific studies with contradictory data? Almost all of them were commissioned by oil companies to publish the results they wanted published. Sort of like the tobacco companies finding doctors to publish studies that declared there were no discernable risks to cigarette smoking.

University of California professor Naomi Oreskes summed up the "scientific" contradictions in a piece in the Washington Post.

"So why does it seem as if there is major scientific disagreement? Because a few noisy skeptics - most of whom are not even scientists - have generated a lot of chatter in the mass media. MIT professor Richard Lindzen recently dismissed the consensus as "religious belief." To be sure, no scientific conclusion can ever be proven, absolutely, but it is no more a "belief" to say that Earth is heating up than it is to say that continents move, that germs


cause disease or that DNA carries hereditary information. You can always find someone, somewhere, to disagree, but these conclusions represent our best available science, and therefore our best basis for reasoned action."

Basically, if you give people enough money or enough motiviation they can conjure up a scientific study that says whatever you'd like it to say.

The global warming problem has a lot to do with money. Reducing our dependance on fossil fuels is going to take billions in research and development and is also going to take billions out of the oil companies pockets. Developing alternative forms of energy and incorporating environmentally friendly changes into the lives of Americans is also going to cost a lot. But the alternatives are unacceptable. The harsh reality is we really do only have one planet, and saving it is going to require all of us all to make an effort-no matter how small.

We feel about global warming the same as we do for any complex problem with no solution: nothing I can do about it. And like all complex problems, there is always something we can do about it. In this case, the first step is simply being informed so we can distinguish from real dialogue and political chatter.

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

Gas Prices Edge Down For Second Week

Even with a second week of price drops at the gasoline pump, motorists in the Dallas-Fort Worth area are still paying near the highest prices for gas in Texas, according to AAA Texas' Weekend Gas Watch

Last week, Dallas-Fort Worth drivers on average were shelling out \$2.941 a gallon, the highest in the state, compared to this week's \$2.903 a gallon, a drop of 3.8 cents. The Galveston-Texas City area edged past Dallas-Fort Worth this week with pump prices averaging \$2.904 a gallon, down 0.2 cents from last week. In Houston, the average price for gas fell 1.6 cents to \$2.897 per gallon. The average price for gasoline fell 9.3 cents a gallon in Corpus Christi to \$2.657, the cheapest gas in the state.

The statewide average for gas is \$2.823 a gallon, down 3.9 cents from last week and nearly 70 cents more than this time last year.

"Not on our watch," said Rep. Barbara Lee, D-Calif., "Not on our watch will we allow another genocide to take place." She wore a green T-shirt that read, "End the Darfur Genocide."

The Sudanese government and the main Darfur rebel group signed an agreement on May 5 to end Darfur's threeyear civil war, which has killed at least 180,000 and displaced some 2 million people. But there have been several attacks since the signing, U.N. officials said.

"Enough is enough," said Rep. John Lewis, D-Ga. "We must do all we can to stop the violence."

The lawmakers, who were handcuffed in plastic "flex cuffs," held the rally on the steps of the embassy with the intention of getting arrested. Last month, five other House members were arrested after a similar protest.

Watt said the group wanted sanctions ratcheted up against Sudan, and the divestment of companies that do business with the country.

Darfur has been torn by violence since rebel groups made up of ethnic Africans rose up against the Arab-led Khartoum government in 2003. The government is accused of responding by unleashing Arab militias known as the Janjaweed who have been accused of some of the war's worst atrocities. Khartoum denies backing the Janjaweed but has said it will try to rein them in since the deal was signed.

The other lawmakers arrested Tuesday were Reps. Gwen Moore, D-Wis., Al Green, D-Texas, Eddie Bernice Johnson, D-Texas, and District of Columbia Delegate Eleanor Holmes Norton, a Democrat.



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

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Housing Secretary Jackson Apologizes For 'Anecdotal Remarks'

Housing Secretary Alphonso Jackson apologized last week for telling a business forum in Dallas, Texas, he had spiked a contract bid of a critic of President Bush.

Jackson has led the Department of Housing and Urban Development since 2003.

His comments at an April 28 real estate conference have spurred calls for investigations from Democratic lawmakers, and the department's internal watchdog said it is looking into the matter.

"I deeply regret the anecdotal remarks I made at a recent Texas small business forum and would like to reassure the public that all HUD contracts are awarded solely on a stringent meritin a written statement Wednesday afternoon.

"During my tenure, no contract has ever been awarded, rejected or rescinded due to the personal or political beliefs of the recipient."

Jackson told the real estate conference he killed a deal with a prospective HUD contractor after the owner told him he had "a problem with your president," the Dallas Business Journal reported earlier this week.

Even though the contractor had "made a heck of a proposal," Jackson reportedly said, "he didn't get the contract."

"Why should I reward someone who doesn't like the president, so they can use funds to try to campaign against the president?"

based process," Jackson said Jackson was quoted as saying. "Logic says they don't get the contract. That's the way I believe."

The remarks prompted Democratic Sen. Frank Lautenberg of New Jersey to call for Jackson's head.

In a letter to Bush, Lautenberg said imposing "political litmus tests" for government contracts violates federal law, "undermines the integrity of our government and leads to the waste of taxpayer dollars."

"If the secretary's statements are an accurate report of his actions, it would be appropriate that he be asked to promptly resign from office," Lautenberg wrote.

He added, "It is abundantly clear that public confidence in government is on the wane, and swift action against this breach of law and common sense is critical."

Bush picked Jackson to lead HUD after Mel Martinez resigned as secretary to mount a successful Senate campaign in Florida.

Jackson had joined the

agency as Martinez's deputy and HUD's chief operating officer in 2001 after running housing authorities in Dallas and St. Louis, Missouri, and an Austin, Texas-based utility.

The agency has a \$32 billion budget and has been heavily involved in reconstruction efforts following Hurricane Katrina.

Sen. Joseph Lieberman, the ranking Democrat on the Senate Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee, urged HUD's inspector general to investigate whether contracts were being awarded "without partiality or political bias."

Mike Zerega, a spokesman for the inspector general, said the HUD watchdog had received "a number of complaints from the public as well as from members of Congress" about Jackson's remarks.

"We are reviewing this matter as to the facts and any applicable law," he said. The situation Jackson

described would have been "totally improper" if true, said Jennifer Gore, a spokeswoman for the Project on Government Oversight, a Washingtonbased watchdog group.

"There is a list of criteria that the federal acquisition regulations say should be considered when awarding federal contracts, and political affiliation, politics, is not supposed to enter into it at all," Gore said.

Procurement decisions are supposed to be handled by career civil servants, not political appointees like Jackson, she said.

New Orleans Picks New - Or Old - Mayor On Saturday

New Orleans' Black voters, from high-profile ministers to everyday citizens, will choose this Saturday between incumbent Mayor Ray Nagin, a Black man elected four years ago by receiving a majority of the White vote and a minority of Black ballots, and Louisiana Lt. Gov. Mitch Landrieu, a White man whose family has a longtime reputation for reaching out to African-Americans.

In the aftermath of the raciallycharged Hurricane Katrina fiasco, whom will they elect?

Orleans illustrate the dilemma in which Black voters find themselves.

Mitch Landrieu is the son of Moon Landrieu, who was New Orleans' last White mayor 30 years ago. Moon Landrieu was first elected in 1969 by forming a multi-racial coalition. He became a symbol of the New South by opening up City Hall to African-Americans. He was re-elected by a landslide in 1973 and left office in 1978 only because of term limitations. President Jimmy Carter appointed him as secretary of Housing and Urban Development. Lt. Gov. Mitch Landrieu has established a similar bi-racial coalition for his election bid.

On the other hand, Nagin may have won some points with some African-Americans when he asserted in a Martin Luther King day speech that God wants New Orleans to be "a chocolate city." He later recanted and apologized for his statement. Yet, during a series of mayoral debates sponsored by the National Coalition of Black Civic Participation, Nagin again expressed his belief that New Orleans should again be a majority Black city.

for 33 years with no consideration whatsoever. We need someone who is sympathetic towards that."

Having seen his home in the Lakeview section of the city and his once 110-member Trinity United Missionary Baptist church in the Upper Ninth Ward both destroyed, Rev. Smith is now among the thousands of former and current Black residents of New Orleans who anticipate the results of Saturday's mayoral election just to see who will lead the Hurricane-ravaged city from here.

The winner of Saturday's runoff will have less than two weeks to prepare for another hurricane season. The June 1 target date to complete the 169 miles of levee repairs draws closer.

Don Resio, a senior researcher for the Army Corps of Engineers, says that even though levee repairs are on schedule, the repaired levees still won't be high enough to prevent future flooding.


Speaking to a National Academies of Science committee on Monday, Resio said: "If another Katrina were to occur tomorrow, you're going to have 6 feet of water overtopping some levees. The levees will hold but you're still

Jermaine Parker, who has been living in San Antonio since he lost his home, says it will be issues not race that will decide the election for him.


Having lost everything he owns in the Lower Ninth Ward, the hardest hit of all the neighborhoods, Parker says safety from crime and hurricanes are his basic priorities.

"I want those that will clean up the crime front, shore up the levee system," Parker says. "I want someone who will leave the city like it was, but a better city."

Early voting in the election indicate slightly increased interest over last month's primary. Just seven days before the runoff, about 11,500 people had submitted early ballots, about 500 more than at the same time before the primary, confirmed Jennifer Marusak, spokeswoman for the Louisiana Secretary of State's office. Approximately 5,000 absentee ballots had been received by Saturday, May 13. That's 2,000 more than the same time before the primary.



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"Mayor Nagin should be in the office to clean up what was created during his administration," says lifelong resident Nakia Hooks, who is still working on home repairs while living with relatives in the city. "Someone who knows what happened, when it happened and how it happened. I believe Nagin is the right person for the position."

New Orleans Bishop Paul S. Morton, whose 20,000-member predominately Black congregation was spread across the nation after last August's hurricanes, disagrees.

"For the past four years, Mayor Nagin has not been for African-Americans at all," says Morton, who has resided in Atlanta since his home and one of his three church sites were severely damaged. "We've just been left out of mainstream. I'm just not a person that can be used. To come to African-Americans at the end when you have not done anything for them in four years, I can't take that chance."

The diverse views being debated inside and outside New

Nagin was elected by Whites with 90 percent of the vote four years ago; only 10 percent of Blacks supported him. But a month ago, in a field of 22 candidates, Nagin won only 10 percent of predominately White precincts and about 66 percent in Black neighborhoods. Landrieu won 24 percent of the Black vote and 30 percent of the White vote.

Some residents will vote for Nagin simply because he's Black. Others could care less about the race of the candidate, only about who will help them rebuild their homes and make the city safe for future hurricanes.

"We're sitting on a powder keg waiting to see what's going to happen, especially those of us who live nearest the lake where that water came in," says the Rev. Louis W. Smith, a New Orleans native who has lived with relatives in Jackson, Miss. since the hurricane. "For those of us who are trying to get on our feet, we want the mayor and the governor to see that we are treated justly; that the insurance companies won't be allowed to just outright take people's properties that they have paid insurance

According to the New Orleans Times-Picayune, Resio said, "It's clear that Category 4 or Category 5 hurricane protection cannot be build within the existing (levee) footprint. And you've still got to wrestle with what the nation wants to invest in overall protection of southeast Louisiana. Whether it's a combination of levees, a frontal barrier system or just an evacuation system."

Blacks supporting Nagin remember his emotional - sometimes profane – plea for help from the Bush Administration. While Nagin often points to his experience in dealing with Katrina, many voters don't trust him to lead the city through another crisis.

Between running errands and making phone calls to maintain his property ownership, Rev. Smith says he has already cast an absentee ballot for Landrieu. He explains, "Number one, the mayor has to be a person that is going to be sympathetic to the Black community." Obviously, he doesn't feel that Nagin is that person.

Much is riding on Saturday's turnout for both candidates and constituents. About 36 percent of the city's 297,000 eligible voters went to the polls last month. Overall, Nagin got 38 percent of the vote while Landrieu got 29 percent. Nagin appears to face the tougher challenge because 62 percent of his constituents voted for another candidate.

Republicans and Democrats, the Senate moved toward the first of several showdown votes over the next week or so on immigration legislation that followed the president's general recommendations. The measure provides greater border security, establishes a new guest worker program and offers an eventual chance at citizenship for most of the estimated 11 million to 12 million immigrants in the country illegally.

Democrats responded with a pledge of cooperation and a barbed question for the commander in chief. Bush "has the power to call up the National Guard to patrol the border,"

said Illinois Sen. Dick Durbin, the second-ranking Democrat. "But does he have the power to lead his own Republican forces in Congress in support of real immigration reform?"

Durbin's jab was aimed at anticipated year-end compromise negotiations with House Republicans. But the next move in an election-year struggle belonged to the Senate, where, hours before Bush spoke, debate opened on a bipartisan bill that generally met his specifications.

After months of political bickering, Senate Majority Leader Bill Frist, R-Tenn., and his Democratic counterpart, Sen. Harry Reid (news, bio, voting record) of Nevada, agreed the

Senate was on track for passage of the bill by Memorial Day.

The centerpièce of Bush's speech Monday night from the Oval office was his announcement that as many as 6,000 National Guard troops would be dispatched to states along the Mexican border to provide intelligence and surveillance support to Border Patrol agents. The Border Patrol would remain responsible for catching and detaining illegal immigrants.

"We do not yet have full control of the border, and I am determined to change that," the president said.

Still, Bush insisted, "The United States is not going to militarize the southern border.

Rarely does a film generate a lot of controversy even before it's been made. But that's exactly what we have with Diary of a Tired Black Man, a movie ostensibly designed as an answer to such brotherbashing, revenge comedies as Diary of a Mad Black Woman, Two Can Play That Game and Waiting to Exhale.

What has spurred interest in the upcoming flick is a snippet available on the Internet at www.tiredblackman.com in which Jimmy Jean-Louis shows up with his white girlfriend to take custody of his daughter for the weekend. Although his ex-wife (Paula Lema) and her girlfriends (Shavsha Isreal and Natasha Dixon) proceed to rake him over the coals, the self-proclaimed "tired black man" manages to get the better of his adversaries during the heated exchange.

With the movie already enjoying so much buzz, I figured why wait for the release to talk to Tim Alexander, the writer and director about to make his feature film debut with the upcoming picture everybody's been emailing, text messaging, chatrooming, instant messaging and clogging talk show phone lines about.

KW: So, what inspired you to make Diary of a Tired Black Man?

KW: But don't you think that many have been victimized by brothers with a player mentality? There are an awful lot of sisters who have been abandoned without child support to raise ten. And that's something that kids alone.

TA: I agree, there are a lot of men who aren't good for them. But for some reason, when a black woman gets with a good black man, she thinks he's weak, she thinks he's a punk. If you're a single-mom, I can appreciate that you're facing certain challenges. But does that give you the right to treat a good black man with such anger and contempt? I don't think so.

KW: What do you think is the source of their problem?

TA: I equate them almost with child molesters who grew up to become child molesters. They didn't like it at the time but still grew up to do the same thing, because they understand how to fight, and the struggle, and all the drama. But what they doesn't understand is how to get along. And so when they're with a nice guy, they get frustrated, lose their comfort level, because all of a sudden they have more responsibility to actually pull their weight in the relationship. 


