Citing Health Concerns, Farrakhan Turns Over Control Of NOI To Administrative Body

Likening his predicament to that of Cuba's Fidel Castro, Minister Louis Farrakhan says he is facing some serious health challenges, causing him to turn over administration of the Nation of Islam to its executive board and cancel all appointments and personal appearances until further notice.

Farrakhan said his illness is related to the heavy dosage of radiation he received as a result of having prostate cancer in the late 1990s. He underwent surgery in November 2000 at Howard University and on a recent visit there was found to have an infection and inflammation.

"I have been suffering from the after-effects of an extreme-



ly high dose of radiated seed implantation that indeed killed the cancer cells that had broken the prostate capsule, but over time, these seeds have done severe internal damage," he explained.

Farrakhan said his illness represents "a period of testing" for his organization.

U.S. First Lady Laura Bush described Ellen as "an amazing woman" with "every reason to be praised."







Know where your teens are and who they're with. Cell phones make it easier than ever to just "check in." It's not saying that you don't respect their space or don't trust them. It's sending a clear message that you care.

Above all else, you are the number one influence in your teens' lives so lead by example because your teens are learning from you. Show the teens you love that actions speak louder than words. Set the rules, enforce the rules and talk to your teens about risky behaviors and consequences. Ensure that your teens have a future that is filled with hope and success.



Where Are Today's Civil Rights Leaders?

Recently a friend offered me a list of top American leaders. It included former Secretary of State Colin Powell, U.S. Sen. Barack Obama, entertainers Bill Cosby and Oprah Winfrey, Time Warner CEO Dick Parsons, evangelist T.D. Jakes, and golfer Tiger Woods. What is striking about the list is that all of the above are black Americans.

Equally striking is that none of the names on the list belongs to anyone whose title is "civil rights leader." A generation ago any list of top black leaders would have been dominated by civil rights leaders. A list from the 1960s would begin with the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Ir., Rov Wilkins, Thurgood Marshall and Malcolm X. Today black people with that kind of leadership talent are busy breaking through doors previously closed to people of color and making their mark in politics, business, academia and more. This is the fruit of the integrationist, "mountaintop" vision that past civil rights leaders struggled to make a reality for their children.

Today, there is an absence of major voices to speak out about key economic and social issues that weigh on poor black people. Critical concerns such as the persistence of a 25 percent poverty rate among blacks nationally - about triple the poverty rate for white Americans - are left with no guiding hand.

Other issues left unattended: About half of America's black children drop out of high school. Among black students who stay "achievement gap" in basic reading and math skills between black and white students. Those students may get the same diploma on graduation day but it is a ticket to two very different sets of job opportunities and incomes in a world of economic competition with fewer blue-collar jobs for the poorly educated.

70 percent of black children today are born to unwed mothers. This is an almost certain recipe for family breakdown, educational failure, and poverty.

More than 40 percent of state and federal inmates are black, which is far out of proportion to the 13 percent of black people in the nation. Where is the leadership on the sad acceptance of criminal behavior and drug use that leads to this appalling high rate of incarceration?

When I wrote Eyes on the Prize: America's Civil Rights Years, 1954-1965, I had a sense of awe at the ability of black leaders of that period to put aside disparate personalities and ideas and focus on creating strategies and coalitions to defeat the laws of segregation. When reading that book or watching the accompanying PBS series, take note of the quality of black leaders on display at a time of rank segregation and pitiful financial resources compared with the level of opportunity and wealth in black America today.

Today's pale version of civil rights leadership never taps into the powerful tradition of selfhelp. Instead the sole focus is on grievances - charges of discrimination and calls for increased government spending for social programs that are based on appeals to white guilt.

Where is today's leadership voice calling for proud, capable Fox News.

in school, there is a yawning black Americans, especially poor black people, to take advantage of unprecedented opportunities in this genera-

Today's fight is to make high school graduation a priority for every black child. This century's civil rights movement requires attention to marriage as a key to family stability, good parenting and increased wealth. New leadership has to work to get poor people out of neighborhoods full of failing schools, crime and dysfunctional behavior. Such places cripple the spirit and hold people down.

When comedian Bill Cosby called for leadership on these issues at a celebration of the 50th anniversary of Brown v. Board of Education, he was attacked by critics. They said he did not understand the continued power of racism. The truth is that Cosby's voice was prophetic. Racism does remain a fact, but the central challenge for this era of black leadership is to rescue black people still in poverty's grip. Until this unpleasant truth is confronted, the progress of poor blacks will remain stagnant.

Cosby's words may seem harsh, but his unflinching look at the state of things is precisely the type of leadership that the black community needs today. It's the next step in that ultimate ascension to Dr. King's mountaintop.

The 'Ghettoization' Of AIDS - A Reply

When we started a think tank to focus on AIDS in Black America seven years ago, we had one goal above all else: Convince Black people that AIDS was our problem. Our slogan -- "Our People, Our Problem, Our Solution" - is just a catchy way of saying the obvious: we can't fix something until we at least acknowledge it's broken.

Well, we've come a long way, baby. And Black America's increasing clarity of mission surrounding AIDS has never been more prominently displayed than it was last month, when tens of thousands of AIDS experts and advocates gathered in Toronto for the global AIDS conference. There, African-American leaders took center stage to, as NAACP Chair Julian Bond put it, "accept ownership and fight [HIV/AIDS] with everything we have."

An historic contingent of Black leaders, most of whom represent traditional Black institutions, convened a press conference on Monday, August 14 to launch a mass Black mobilization. Each of these groups agreed to push AIDS to the top of their agendas and incorporate it into the fabric of their work. African-Americans had finally made a statement to the world: In 2006, AIDS in America is a Black disease.

These leaders get it, and they're taking action as a result. But, sadly, there are still some out there missing the boat.

In a Sept. 4 editorial the Boston Globe warned that "ghettoization of the AIDS epidemic weakens the fight against it." Having witnessed the outpouring of Black leadership in Toronto, the Globe saw not a community finally ready to stand up and fight for itself but one walking into a trap. And it articulated a perspective that has paralyzed Black folks for too long.

By calling AIDS "a Black disease," the Globe warned, we risk turning away allies within

gle. With drugs, poverty and deadly health problems already plaguing Black neighborhoods, nobody wants to load more onto our plate.

These are all reasonable concerns. If Katrina revealed nothing else, it made plain that our government will leave Black people to die if allowed to do so. So we must not allow it. It's that simple.

The problem is the Globe describes exactly what both White and Black leaders have already spent the past 25 deadly years doing. Refusing to acknowledge the epidemic's vastly disproportionate impact on African-Americans has done nothing to change that ugly reality.

We tried putting our heads in the sand and not acknowledging the carnage unfolding in our neighborhoods. We tried convincing policy makers that this was everybody's problem, equally shared. We tried acting like it wasn't a Black disease -and all that happened was the disease kept getting Blacker. We looked up and found that roughly half of all Americans living with AIDS and half all Americans getting HIV each year are Black. We found that three quarters of women getting it are Black, and that nearly half of Black gay and bisexual men may already be infected. We found Black people with HIV eight times more likely to die from the disease than Whites.

That's where not "labeling" AIDS a Black disease has got

As of January, Washington was spending \$200 million a day on the war in Iraq, according to the Congressional Budget Office. That means each month our war spending nearly triples what we spend on HIV/AIDS care in the United States all year. This is not acceptable, and our community must not allow it to continue.

We are where we are with this epidemic because of denial and a lack of leadership. It didn't have to be this way, and I wish it weren't. But wishing it were not so is not the same as making it not so. I cringe every time I say, "AIDS in America is a Black disease" -- but not as much as I cringe every time I get a call from a Black teenager who just tested positive for HIV, or a Black woman who just found out she has AIDS, or someone letting me know that yet another of my brothers or sisters has died.

To bring all of this to an end, first and foremost African Americans must acknowledge that AIDS is in fact our problem. We can't fix what we won't admit is broken.

State Of Sickle Cell Disease Is Focus Of National Conference In Dallas

chers, clinicians, policy makers, and minority health leaders will address the state of Sickle Cell Disease awareness and treatment in this country when the Sickle Cell Disease Association of America (SCDAA) holds it 34th annual meeting September 27-30 at the Hyatt Regency Dallas at Reunion in Dallas, Texas.

Taking place as National Sickle Cell Disease Awareness Month comes to a close, SCDAA's convention -- Sickle Cell Disease: Meeting Unmet Needs -- is the largest national forum focusing on the issues affecting the estimated 80,000 people in the U.S. with Sickle Cell Disease (SCD). An inherited blood disorder affecting the red blood cells, SCD is a lifelong condition that causes anemia and jaundice and can result in serious lung tissue damage, stroke, and debilitatcure for SCD, early diagnosis can help people live longer, healthier and more productive

Because SCD lasts a lifetime, patients face many challenges, which is why the 2006 SCDAA annual meeting will include over 40 educational sessions focusing specifically on such topics as overcoming the disparities in how adults with SCD receive treatment for acute and chronic pain, an area where many patients are at risk for inadequate pain control. The forum will also provide important new findings about treatment options for one of the complications of SCD, iron overload, which occurs when patients receive repeated blood transfusions. If left unchecked, the excess iron in the blood can gather in the heart, liver, and other organs and may lead to organ damage.

Researchers say that out of every dollar African Americans spend, 95 cents is spent outside of our own community and only 5 cents of every dollar within our own community. Other communities may spend 10 times or more before that dollar leaves their community. African Americans in Collin County have an opportunity for both social and economic success. Black Colleges Struggle To Keep Students

Experts Say Aging Campuses, Inferior Facilities Are Reasons for Decline

When Jessica Page visited Hampton University in March, she considered the trip a formality. She had already made up her mind to attend the school, considered by many a jewel among the nation's historically black institutions. Then she saw the campus.

The dorms weren't as sleek as she had pictured. Buildings seemed antiquated. Was this "The Real HU" she had heard about?

"I wasn't impressed," said Page, who later enrolled at the University of Virginia at

Janet Jackson, "20 Y.O."

If there's one characteristic Janet Jackson has recently perfected, it's resilience.

She didn't let that little Super Bowl wardrobe malfunction or lukewarm reviews for her last album, "Damita Jo," break her spirit. And after pictures surfaced this summer revealing Jackson as a betweenalbum chubbster, she miraculously shed the pounds, chiseled the abs and gave a virtual I-ain't-gone-yet wink to the likes of Rihanna, Ciara, Kelis and Beyonce vying for top diva honors.

Now, as Jackson drops her ninth disc, "20 Y.O." - or 20 Years Old, her "age" since the release of her 1986 breakthrough album, "Control," - it seems she's half-naked on the cover of every other magazine on the newsstand. Pretty darn good for a 40-year-old.

Resilience, however, doesn't mean innovation. And on "20 Y.O.," one can't help but sense that Jackson is coasting.

Since 1993's "Janet," she's used sexuality as a calling card, with suggestive or even downright graphic bedroom vocals. Jackson's new album is no different - she's stuck on revealing



overdrive dying to have you inside me, baby," she promises on the disc's opener, "So Excited," a track featuring Miami raunchy rapstress Khia.

Yet "20 Y.O." doesn't come off concept-heavy like 2001's "All For You" or as forced as "Damita Jo." Instead, Jackson operates within her comfort zone, however narrow it may seem. Her heaving, breathy vocals tiptoe above slow grooves ("With U," "Love 2 Love") and danceable, electro-synth beats ("Show Me") supplied by longtime collaborators Jimmy Jam and Terry Lewis, plus boyfriend Jermaine Dupri, who co-produces seven of the 11 complete songs.

Dupri's hip-hop sensibility subtly contemporizes Jackson's sound, whether with an uncredited rapped verse on "This Body," the "bounce wit me" ad-libs on "Do It 2 Me" or an Afrika Bambaataa sample on the uptempo come-on "Get It Out Me."

But that's where the envelope-pushing ends. Otherwise, "20 Y.O." is a fleeting good time, but far from the career-capping album we'd expect from such an iconic figure. Over the feel-good groove and piano plinks of "Enjoy," Jackson sings, "Livin' everyday like it's my last/ I refuse to be stuck in the past." Jackson may have figured out how stay up to date, but the jury's out on whether she'll push herself to do more than the familiar.
