

Call me strange, but I tend to get excited about truly new ideas and concepts. That's why I was blown away last week when Bangladesh's Muhammad Yunus and his Grameen Bank were awarded the Nobel Peace Prize last week. Yunus was awarded the prize for his pioneering work in the field of microfinance, specifically microcredit.

I can hear the voice in your head right now saying what is microcredit?

I'm glad you asked that question.

Microcredit describes lending programs that extend small loans to very poor people for self-employment projects that generate income and allow them to lift themselves out of poverty. The so-called "barefoot bankers" attack poverty by making loans available to the world's 1.2 billion people. These loans have enabled millions of poor people in developing nations to set up the small business that will allow them to escape poverty. These loans are typically under \$100, and have been used for everything from buying a cow to sell milk, to buying a sewing machine to sell garments.

Economist Muhammad Yunus started issuing these small loans in Bangladesh in 1976 when he established the Grameen Bank. His first client was a woman who made wooden stools at a profit of only 2 cents a day. With her \$6 loan (yes, \$6 bucks), she was able to avoid paying exorbitant interest to loan sharks and buy raw materials at a cheaper rate. Her daily profit increased to \$1.25 per day.

Thirty years later, the use of microcredit has flourished. Yunus' Grameen Bank now claims to have 6.6 million borrowers, 97 percent of whom are

women. The World Bank estimates that there are now more than 7,000 microfinancing institutions (MFIs), serving 16 million poor people in both the developing and industrialized world.

This concept has had an incredible effect on societies around the globe according to Elizabeth Littlefield, chief executive of the Consultative Group to Assist the Poor (CGAP) thinktank.

"Microfinance tends to lead to the empowerment of women, who in turn...then plan a more active role in their communities. They run for local office, they stand up for the needs of their families. That can lead to a more democratic society,' she said.

The most amazing thing about microcredit that been the rate of repayment of the loans. Traditional lenders have resisted lending to the poor because of fears about loan default rates. This has not been the case with microfinancing.

"In Bangladesh even the most conservative estimates suggest that its repayment rate has been incredibly high, about 90 percent," said Maitreesh Ghatuk, professor at the London School of Economics. "Compared to any comparable government program that lends to poor people, this is a stupendous achievement."

So... let's review... people (mostly women), rejected for small business start up loans, who traditionally pay exorbitant rates of interest for the loans they do get; can obtain small amounts of financing which empowers them, makes them more productive and allows them to productively contribute to society-all while becoming small business owners? (I know that was a really long, run-on sentence, but bear with me, I'm trying to make a point.)

Where is our microcredit? I'm referring to microcredit in the United States for black people who want to be entrepre-

neurs, but don't qualify for traditional bank financing. The single moms that desire a better life for themselves and their children and want to actually own something. I'm asking for those men and women who would pay back small loans if some lending institution would only give them a chance.

I'm talking about people you know who want to start their own business -your relatives, your friends, your co-workers....yourself.

The Roslow Research Group estimated in 1999 that there were 1.3 million Hispanic and 1.2 million African Americans who were self employed with fewer than five employees. Of the 13.1 million "microentrepreneurs in the U.S., 10.8 million had received no bank financing for their business. The remarkable thing is that 12.9 percent had been denied for a loan, but 41.5 percent had considered a loan but thought they would be rejected.

There is a big gap in small business financing in America, and its time for something new to happen in this country economically.

I'm no genius, but it seems to me this is the type of concept both political parties should be pitching to the U.S. voters. This is something productive the government could subsidize, or at least give tax breaks to banks that offered such loans. It wouldn't be handouts or giveaways, it would be capitalism working to finance the dreams of an overlooked segment of society.

One of the things I've always disliked about Republican dogma was the way they implored everyone to "pull themselves up by their own bootstraps'. I never could figure out how that concept worked for people with no boots. It looks like some people in the developing countries of the world are showing us how.

The Hard Facts Of Black America

turncoat by community leaders defends his views on African Americans helping themselves.

Why not just go ahead and call me an Uncle Tom and a sellout? Why bother with trying to put a new coat of paint on the same old personal attacks by saying that I am "demeaning black people," that I'm the "black Ann Coulter" and a turncoat against the cause of racial progress for black people in the United States?

That's a sampling of the nastiness flying at me since I wrote a book that holds today's civil rights leaders accountable for serious problems inside black America. I've suggested that many poor people are capable of helping themselves by graduating high school, keeping a job and having children when they're married and ready to be parents.

It is easier to attack me than to deal with some hard facts. Here I go again, but let's look at the facts.

One hard, unforgiving fact is that 70% of black children are born today to single mothers. This is at the heart of the breakdown of the black family, the cornerstone of black life for generations. Some of these children without two parents may turn out just fine, but most add stress to the lives of their grandparents, neighbors, police and teachers who have to take up the slack for absent or bad parents.

It is easier to attack me than to deal with the hard fact of a dropout rate now at about 50% nationwide for black and Latino students. The average black student who gets a high school diploma today is reading and doing math at an eighth-grade level. Even with a diploma, that young person is ill-prepared to for a college degree.

In an era of global economic competition — when it is harder to find a job, pay the rent and afford health insurance - there is little room to argue with the fact that it is a national crisis to find so many children of any race failing in school. But it is especially disturbing that so many of those children are black and Latino; they have the added burden of being people of color in a society in which race remains a real factor.

And what about the tragic fact of a 25% poverty rate among black Americans? That's more than twice the 12% national poverty rate and more than triple the poverty rate among whites.

My critics are busy blaming racism for all this poverty. But that tactic is losing its punch because so many people of color, including black people from Africa and the Caribbean, arrive in this country and outperform native-born black people in educational achievement and income. And it is hard to make the old "racism is the whole problem" argument when the other 75% of black America is taking advantage of 50 years of new opportunities - since Brown vs. Board of Education and the Civil Rights Act - to create the largest black middle class in history, with unprecedented wealth and political power.

The core group of black people trapped in poverty today is not defined by lack of opportunity as much as by bad choices. Black youth culture is boiling over with nihilism. It embraces failure and frustration, including random crime and jail time, as the authentic expression of black life. "Keeping it real" and "street cred" in that destructive world require gunshot victims, It."

A journalist decried as a compete for entry-level jobs or the "N-word" and treating women as "bitches" and "hos." There is no arguing that this is a sick mind-set.

> Here are some more facts: 44% of the nation's prison population is made up of black people, and blacks account for 37% of violent crimes, although black Americans are only 13% of the population. Who can make the case that this is anything but a social disaster?

> Yet I'm condemned for asking why today's prominent civil rights leaders, such as Jesse Jackson, Al Sharpton and Maxine Waters, are not dealing with these problems. They prefer to call for more government programs and more white guilt.

> And yet a poll done by the Pew Research Center a week after Hurricane Katrina found that two-thirds of black Americans agree with 75% of white Americans who say that too many poor people are overly dependent on government programs. In other words, a clear majority of the nation, including most black people, are saving that the poor need to look in the mirror and halt self-defeating behavior.

Most of all, black people are saying that the poor are not victims but people who are capable of helping themselves.

These are the facts, whether or not you call me a Tom and whether or not I write them.

signs in public education is the slow disappearance of students, especially African-American youth, from high schools across this nation. The statistics are staggering. Three out of every 10 public school students who started ninth grade in September will drop out of school before graduation.

Nationally, only five in 10 African American students graduate on time with a high school diploma. The situation in the Baltimore City Public Schools is equally grim. According to a recent analysis, Baltimore graduates less than half, 48 percent, of their incoming freshmen on time.

What happens when teenagers drop out of school? Without the required education to obtain a good-paying job, most dropouts face a bleak future. They earn, on average, less than high school graduates and are more likely to be unemployed. This wage gap often remains with them throughout their lives. Studies show that each class of high school dropouts costs the nation more than \$200 billion in lost wages and tax revenues as well as spending for social support programs.

As educators, we must face this crisis head-on with a comprehensive plan to reduce high

The Texas Black Sports Hall of Fame was established in 1996 to honor coaches and athletes of high character and athletic achievement, who are either Texans by birth or by athletic participation (collegiate or professional), and who have made a recognizable contribution to African American

school dropouts. Putting this plan into action will require the combined efforts of parents, clergy, educators, administrators, community-based organizations, businesses, and federal, state and local governments.

There are many proven approaches to combating rising dropout rates. Educators need the training and resources to spot the common dropout indicators: poor grades, poor attendance, poor family support and lack of interest. Students need expanded graduation options in career and technical fields and in alternative schools so that youngsters have multiple paths to earn a diploma and achieve success.

And early intervention is key. Children at risk need to be identified at a young age-as early as grade school-so that sustained support can be applied. Research shows that success in the elementary grades diminishes the possibility of later dropping out in high school.

Drawn from a wide range of experience and data, these strategies are successful at improving student achievement and decreasing dropouts. Nevertheless, now is the time to do more. Compulsory school attendance laws must be reformed to make a high school diploma or its equivalent mandatory for all students

below the age of 21.

In Maryland and 23 other states students can legally quit school when they turn 16. It is appropriate and critical to eradicate the idea of leaving school without a diploma-to compete in the 21st century, all of our citizens, at a minimum, need a high school education. So options such as high school graduation centers for adults 19 to 21 years old must be readily available to provide specialized instruction and counseling apart from younger students.

Above all, we must listen to dropouts themselves and help youngsters overcome their sense of disconnectedness. Schools must begin to meet students' needs with a stimulating and relevant curriculum. And caring adults must be prepared to step in and end the slow disengagement that leads 16-year-olds to opt out of their basic right to an education.

Now is the time to act and to act together as educators, lawmakers and as community members to turn the tide on this silent epidemic.





Southwest Airlines Unveils New Love Field Service

Southwest Airlines Co. expects to win several thousand new customers a day and more than \$50 million in revenue from its 25 new one-stop destinations now available out of

Dallas Love Field. The Dallas-based airline also expects to add new employees at city-owned Love Field, as well as new aircraft and flights new to accommodate the anticipated increase in demand, according to Gary Kelly, vice chairman and CEO of Southwest

(NYSE: LUV). In a conference call with reporters announcing the service to new markets, Kelly applauded the Wright Amendment Reform Act, recently signed into law by President Bush and approved by the Federal Aviation Administration.

nullifies the 1979 Wright Amendment ban on long-haul flights from Love, will allow nonstop, long-haul flights from the airport by 2014. The new destinations available now are the



result of lifting through-ticketing restrictions, making it possible for Southwest to open up its reservation system to existing long-haul itineraries, said Kelly. "We are simply unrestricting the connecting opportunities that exist within our flight schedule today," said Kelly. "We are not adding any aircraft or changing any flights or routes. ... For the

entire route network as it was originally flown."

As stipulated by the act, commercial airlines flying scheduled service out of Love, may fly anywhere in the nation now, but only after touching down once in

a close-in, nine-state Wright Amendment area. International flights remain off-limits.

Southwest passengers previously had to buy two tickets for two flights -which includes deplaning and switching baggage - if they wanted to fly to or from Love Field.

The new destinations are: Baltimore/Washington; Chicago Midway; Cleveland; Columbus, Ohio; Denver; Detroit; Fort Lauderdale/Hollywood, Fla.; Indianapolis; Jacksonville, Fla.; Las Vegas; Los Angeles; Louisville, Ky.; Nashville, Tenn.; Oakland, Calif.; Omaha, Neb.; Orlando, Fla.; Philadelphia; Phoenix; Portland, Ore.; Sacramento, Calif.; Salt Lake ple flying," said Kelly.

The reform, which ultimately first time, Dallas has access to the City; San Diego; Seattle/Tacoma; Tampa Bay, Fla.; and Tucson, Ariz.

> That translates to about 101 new itineraries a day out of Love Field, said Kelly.

For example, there will now be seven one-stop flights to Los Angeles, 14 to Phoenix, nine to Baltimore, eight to Chicago, six to San Diego, five to Orlando and two to Denver, all connecting through various close-in cities, like Houston, Kansas City, Albuquerque or St. Louis. In some cases, passengers won't have to switch planes; in others, they will.

Currently Southwest operates 18 itineraries from Dallas, with 14 nonstop flights to cities in Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Alabama, Mississippi, Kansas and Missouri.

To start off the new destinations, Southwest is offering \$99 one-way fares to the 25 cities.

"We're confident that by lowering the fares, we'll see more peo-



The NAACP will monitor voting in 10 states next month, sending observers to polling places, taking citizen complaints and notifying the Justice Department of any serious problems, the civil rights organization announced Monday.

The states were chosen because of pivotal elections, concentrations of black voters, or a history of polling problems, the Baltimore-based organization said.

President Bruce Gordon said the organization intends to be proactive "to ensure that Nov. 7 comes and goes smoothly and that every citizen across this country, and particularly in the state of Maryland, who has an interest in voting, in fact is able to vote."

New Book Addresses Homophobia In Black Church

Attempting to break "hundreds of years of silence," a new, controversial book argues that pervasive homophobia in the historically black church has reached "crisis" proportion.

"The black church's teaching that homosexuality is immoral has created a crisis for lesbian and gay Christians in black churches," the Rev. Horace L. Griffin, an Episcopal priest, writes in the preface of his new book, "Their Own Receive Them Not: African American Lesbian and Gays in Black Churches." The book is being officially released on October 15 by Cleveland- based The Pilgrim Press.

"This black-church-sanctioned homophobia produces a lot of twisted black people," he writes

Griffin, who is black and gay, grew up in a Missionary Baptist church experience, he has witnessed how "black church leaders and congregants have been resistant and even closed in treating gay and heterosexual congregants equally or, in many cases, of simply offering compassion to gay people."

In his 240-page hardcover book, he now attempts to deconstruct the history and legacy of homophobia in the black church using a sociological, theological and biblical lens.

Comparing the plight of black gays and lesbians to "a game of Russian roulette," where the children of the church are no longer welcomed by the church, black lesbian and gay Christians find themselves in "no-win situations," he says. The end result robs them of "their soul, if not their integrity, family and lives." Griffin, who teaches pastoral theology and directs field education at The church. Based on his life and General Theological Seminary of

the Episcopal Church in New secrets," says Griffin, have led to York City, says black church leaders use the Bible to oppress gays and lesbians in a similar fashion to

the approach once used by white church leaders to oppress blacks during slavery and segregation.

tragic outcomes, including a quiet complicity with the HIV/AIDS epidemic. "Even after two decades of AIDS research ... African American ministers, for the most part, display almost no change in their attitudes that AIDS is God's retribution on the 'sinful," he writes.

Griffin also believes the church's "secrets" have led to less- than-honest sexual practices among its members.

"Until black church leaders different Christian adopt approaches, 'Down Low' practices will continue," Griffin writes in reference to closeted, sexual activities of some black men with other men.

The book's arrival on bookstore shelves comes at a time when the worldwide Anglican Communion is facing schism over issues related to homosexu-The black church's "sexual ality. The divide has pitted the

largely-white Episcopal Church in the United States against the more- conservative and growing Anglican churches in Africa.

Griffin says the black church often "rewards" its gay and lesbian ministers and members for staying in the closet.

"Everyone within black churches realizes that there is reward and acceptance for those presenting themselves as hetero-

sexual, while (out) gays and lesbians encounter ridicule and condemnation," Griffin writes. "Even in churches where it is 'known' that the pastor is gay, black church Christians are content to remain in the church if the pastor is willing to present himself as heterosexual with a wife and children."



This year, 624 pastors and church leaders attended - up more than 100 from last year - and 154 received Church Development Certificates in areas such as leadership, counseling and theology. The Urban Alternative, Dr. Forty-seven took comprehensive training in the National Church Adopt-A-School Initiative.

"This is one of the greatest Church Development Conferences we've had," Dr. Evans said.
