Car title loans drive consumers to financial disaster

In today's still-struggling economy, many consumers find themselves short on cash. When consumers seek a credit remedy, one particular lender is likely to bring more problems than solutions: companies that make car title loans.

According to new joint research report by the Consumer Federation of America (CFA) and the Center for Responsible Lending (CRL), the average car-title loan of \$951 winds up costing the typical borrower \$2,142 in interest. Nationwide, 7,730 car-title lenders in 21 states reap \$3.6 billion in interest on loans valued at only \$1.6 bil-



The car-title loan uses a borrower's personal vehicle as collateral and additionally charges triple-digit interest rates, like those of payday loans. And similar to payday loans, the typical car-title loan requires full repayment in just one month. When borrowers cannot afford to pay in full, they are forced to

Birmingham to the March on Washington, reflecting on the 50th anniversaries of the Civil Rights Movement this year has made Black History Month especially poignant. As a little girl on the south side of Chicago, I grew up with parents who did not have many material things, but built a home rooted in love and a deep belief in my ability to achieve anything with a great education. I had the

rare chance to attend schools that many of my peers could not access and. from a young age, I understood the disparity in the quality of education from school to school and neighborhood to neighborhood.

Today, as Teach For America's executive vice president for teacher preparation, support, and development, I am grateful for my home and my background, and draw from my experiences each day to inform my approach to how

"Dallas CASA volunteers are everyday heroes





The One Trillion Dollar Lie

(NNPA) "If you tell a lie big enough and keep repeating it, people will eventually come to believe it. The lie can be maintained only for such time as the State can shield the people from the political, economic and/or military consequences of the lie. It thus becomes vitally important for the State to use all of its powers to repress dissent, for the truth is the mortal enemy of the lie, and thus by extension, the truth is the greatest enemy of the State." Joseph Goebbels

Watching the TV special that reviewed information contained in the book, Hubris: The Inside Story of Spin, Scandal, and the Selling of the Iraq War,

by Michael Isikoff and David Corn, brought back memories of articles and radio shows I had done during the run-up to "shock and awe" in March 2003. It reminded me of how callous and shameless those high level politicians were and how low they would go to get this country into an unnecessarv war.

It gave me pause as I thought of the nearly 5,000 American lives that were lost, the tens of thousands of soldiers who came home incapacitated, minus arms and legs, and the 100,000 Iraqi men, women, and children killed in a war that was supposed to

we develop teachers. I recently had the opportunity to collaborate and connect with hundreds of committed educators, instructional coaches, and experts to share my reflections on the social justice implications of work in education, and the importance of self-knowledge and community partnership as pathways to providing the quality of education that will open our students hearts and minds to their own potential and to future life opportunities.

From 36 states, we gathered in Memphis to discuss teaching as an act of leadership in the context of the city's historical contribution to the fight for civil rights. Grounded in the history and spirit of that city, I challenged the group to embrace our collective responsibility to demonstrate the strength and assets of our students so they

are supported and empowered to believe in their potential and chart a path to achieve their aspirations.

I am more convinced than ever that teachers who create personal transformational experiences for their students are leaders who reflect on their identity and the implications of it, given the narrative in our country around race, class, and privilege. They understand cultural context and its integration with pedagogy and help their students to see the great pride and beauty in their own heritage. Classroom leadership, boldness, and clarity of vision are central to what it will take to empower our students' to reach their deep potential.

I am also convinced that our teachers and students cannot walk this journey alone. We need only look to

exemplars of change to understand how change happens. During the Civil Rights Movement, a social, political, and economic shift in this country occurred because of visionary leadership and unprecedented cooperation. Our teachers and kids need leadership and cooperation from all of us -- the parents, volunteers, advocates, allies, and concerned citizens of their communities

Giving of ourselves is part of what will be required to reach that day when opportunity in our communities is equitably and consistently available. Being a part of the solution is not an easy task and does not come without some challenges along the way. So many people before us have sacrificed their lives so we can continue to forge the

road ahead; and we too will have our own set of sacrifices to pave the road for those who follow us.

When I find myself looking for inspiration and the courage to sacrifice, I look to Dr. King. His words are a compass on the way to equity and justice: "Human progress is neither automatic nor inevitable...Every step toward the goal of justice requires sacrifice, suffering and struggle; the tireless exertions and passionate concern of dedicated individuals." I urge each and every one of us to think about the role we can and must play on the path to justice - our children's futures hang in the balance.

AT&T working on a mobile health solution for seniors

DALLAS - Up until now, an elderly person suffering from a fall or heart attack could use a device around his neck to send for assistance - if he happened to be at home. AT&T is working to overcome this limitation with a mobile health (mHealth) solution that will automatically connect people in distress to medical assistance, in their home or elsewhere. Equally important, the system should track a person's location in real time and let neighbors or relatives know when - and where - a loved one has suffered a mishap.

"This mHealth solution is an example of how innovative technology can revolutionize healthcare," said Geeta Nayyar, M.D., Chief Medical Information Officer, AT&T ForHealthSM, AT&T Business Solutions. "With the mPERS mobility solution AT&T is developing, older people will be able to live independently, but know that they are only seconds away from assistance if the need arises."

This mobile Personal Emergency Response System (mPERS) solution, being developed in collaboration with Valued Relationships Inc. and Numera LibrisTM, plans to use Machine-to-Machine (M2M) connectivity to link people in distress virtually anywhere, at anytime to a professionally staffed monitoring center. Unlike current monitoring systems, which are often confined to a person's home and require the individual in distress to manually press a button for assistance, AT&T's mPERS solution intends to overcome these limitations by automatically triggering a notification to the monitoring center if something happens.

For example: A person wearing a small, portable mobile device suddenly falls. Without that person having to do anything, a sensor within the device alerts the monitoring center. A professional from the call-monitoring center would attempt to reach out to the individual through instant two-way wireless voice communication enabled on AT&T's network. If the center decides further assistance is needed - or isn't able to get a response from the person - within minutes it would alert emergency services to send an ambulance or other emergency medical personnel, as needed.

Designed for elderly people who are living independently, have disabilities, or are prone to falls, AT&T's enterprise mPERS solution will be targeted to nursing agencies; adult day care services and other home care providers. The solution will be the latest addition to AT&T's growing list of mHealth solutions, which are transforming how healthcare is delivered and how people live.

"Even better, their friends, caregivers and relatives can be kept in the loop, if the user so chooses, so they can respond as needed," Nayyar added. "It will transform the whole emergency response experience, by keeping everyone connected, informed and engaged in near real time. I

can't think of a better answer for an active, but aging, baby boomer population."

This solution will be part of AT&T's complete suite of remote patient monitoring (RPM) care so-

lutions, including the AT&T RPM Software-as-a-Service and an end-to-end managed RPM service. Together, these solutions will provide a foundation for full aging-in-place care.

As a member of the NeighborWorks network, BCL of Texas contributed to the more than 121,000 people provided housing counseling by Neighbor-Works organizations last year.

"While a lot has to happen before the Bipartisan Policy Center's Housing Commission report recommendations are implemented, I believe that this is a big step forward for making all types of housing more affordable and accessible for not only families in North Texas, but for families all across the country," says Rios Valdez.



Lassiter, who served as president of El Centro College for 20 years before he became the district's chancellor in 2006, thanked trustees for extending his contract

last year through Dec. 31, 2013, and added that he is willing to remain chancellor until his successor is chosen.

"I simply want to remind you that I intend to retire at the end of this year so that you can begin the search process for my successor. I also am willing to serve beyond this year until you choose my replacement," said Lassiter.

He added, "I wish to express my thanks to the board for their support throughout my tenure. We, as a district,

are in a very good position, but we still have work to do, and we must remain on task as the search process moves forward and as we prepare for the future."

Following Lassiter's comments, the DCCCD board of trustees took its first steps in the search process by unanimously electing board member Bob Ferguson to serve as chair of the search committee and by agreeing that they would serve as the executive committee for the larger search committee.

The board members will meet as a group to discuss the search process and the membership for the full search committee before their regular monthly meeting in April. The trustees are expected to conduct a national search for the next chancellor.

Local executive understands the importance of giving back

Royalyn Reid is a shrewd and successful entrepreneur. As the cofounder and CEO of multi-million dollar company Consumer and Market Insights (CMI), Reid is often sought out locally and nationally as a panelist or subject matter expert. Her company which offers marketing research, training and conference management services – serves federal and commercial clients, both locally and nationally.

Reid's non-corporate, down-to-earth personality shines – not only through her bedazzled smartphone, sparkly blue eye shadow and red polished nails – but also in the way she gives back to the community.

Reid has devoted countless hours mentoring women and minority owned small businesses. She sits on the board of directors of the D/FW Minority Business Development Council and the Women's Business Council Southwest (WBCS) and is a member of the Women's Business Enterprise National Council Forum.

The desire to give back, Reid says, stems from her own religious beliefs about tithing as well as the mentoring she received while growing her business. One of the most influential mentors throughout her career, Reid says, has been Aimee Di-Cicco, senior vice president of sales for FedEx Kinko's. Reid has worked with DiCicco for more than five years.

DiCicco says she's enjoyed watching Reid successfully grow her business and being a part of the process. The nature of

her work with Reid, DiCicco says, has focused on the development of the right sales process for existing and new clients and hiring the right sales personnel.

"I think at the end of the day when you look at our core mission of connecting people with possibilities, I was very lucky to be part of that through FedEx by meeting Royalyn and helping her to do just that with her business," says DiCicco, adding that Reid's strong work ethic and desire for improvement through learning will promote continued growth at CMI.

Helping area youth

Reid also donates her time to the community at large.

For the last two school years, Reid and her employees have volunteered their time and resources at Francisco "Pancho" Medrano Middle School. The company is now poised for its third and final year to give back to students at the school next spring.

Reid adopted the school for three years, after a conversation with former city councilman Steve Salazar on ways to give back to the community. Sigurdson says she's looking forward to the final project because these projects have been a positive experience for Medrano middle school students. Sigurdson appreciates the time that Reid, her parents and employees have spent with them.

"It gave students ownership and made them proud that they were making others happy," Sigurdson says.

Reid's hard work and community contributions have resulted in a number of awards over the years: Volunteer of the Year, Advocate of the Year and Supplier of the Year. This year she was named Woman Business Enterprise of the Year by the WBCS.

Building a business

Prior to starting CMI, Reid worked for 10 years at Mary Kay conducting marketing research and consumer testing. Reid launched CMI with her husband so she could spend more time with their two children but remain a part of the workforce.

Reid credits her ability to acquire clients quickly through networking and past relationships with clients. Her husband Angelo handled other duties such as computer programming and accounting, while maintaining his full-time job at IBM.

built at Mary Kay. CMI's first client was the Dallas/Fort Worth International Airport.

The business started off in the Reid's family dining room in 1998, with Reid working directly collaborative effort between the Dallas County Community College District and the private sector to support economic development for the county.





retain and continue these healthy practices. Once you are done, be sure to dry your hands completely after washing them. To prevent the spread of germs, cough or sneeze into your elbow so germs are not spread to your hands. Also, show your children how to turn their heads away from others and use and toss tissues properly. Be sure to exercise, eat foods that help you have a healthy weight and energy, and get proper rest. When your body is in good physical shape, is well rested, and has appropriate nutrition, it is better able to fight off germs and infec-

Taking care of your own health should not be limited to wintertime. It is a yearround process that is as important to your children as it is to you. Fathers can accompany their children on annual check-ups to help reinforce key health messages from the pediatrician. On occasion, children may accompany their fathers to their check-ups, too, Resources available on the NRFC website confirm that healthy fathers are more available to emotionally and financially support their children and families.

To feel great and stay that way, you need to take into account more than just your physical health. Your psychological and social needs also have an impact on your overall well-being and your ability to be positively involved with your children.

Psychological health -Life can get complicated overwhelming. So being a loving, involved father isn't always easy. If you are depressed, are abusing drugs, or have other issues that affect your emotional and mental health, they can cause problems between you and your children. There are many support and treatment options available to help you get past the barriers that could be holding you back from a better relationship with your children.

Physical health – Exercise regularly. Find an activity that you enjoy so you are more likely to maintain a routine. When planning your workouts, discuss them with your children. Explain your exercise routine and how they can join in too. Set realistic workout goals. Be sure to balance your workouts with proper sleep.

Dietary health – Eat healthy foods in moderate amounts. Drink water and snack on fruits and vegetables. Discuss your diet with your children. When in the grocery store point out healthy choices. Read the labels on food items with your children and discuss nutrition information. You are what you eat, so be sure to encourage and model healthy eating habits for your children.

Social health – How you conduct your adult relationships has a direct effect on your children. Studies show that people who enjoy healthy relationships have more happiness and less stress. If your relationships in the past were stormy or troubled, you can start now to undo attitudes and behaviors that might have contributed to an unsatisfying personal life. Dealing with past mistakes allows you to move forward by establishing positive, fulfilling relationships.

Interpersonal health -Healthy interactions are often the most neglected component of well-being. Healthy relationships take time and effort. Look for ways to add laughter to your activities with your children. Make sure your children know and understand your values by living them every day. Focus on your successes and not what you consider to be your failures. Let your children know that it is OK to fail and that no matter what, you'll always love them.

Children need involved fathers in every aspect of their lives. Similarly, dads can take control of every aspect of their health. Show that you value your health and you'll be a positive role model for your children. Pass your healthy habits on to the next generation.

Many cell phone companies, utility companies and landlords do, too. Other common credit myths:

Myth: It is always better to pay cash for things than finance them with credit.

Fact: An established credit history is necessary for many types of financing, including buying furniture, a computer, a car, or a new home

Myth: I am building credit using my debit card.

Fact: While debit cards offer great convenience.

banks don't report debit card payment activity to the credit bureaus.

Myth: Credit is credit – there's really no difference between different loan types.

Fact: Rates, terms, monthly payments, and benefits vary widely on different types of credit.

Myth: I can't get credit because I've never had credit.

Fact: A few ways to start establishing a strong credit history: consider a secured credit card, or one or

two department store or gas station cards. Above all, manage your accounts responsibly.

Myth: My credit took a hit – it will be nearly impossible to rebuild it.

Fact: You can rebuild your credit and you don't need to put your life on hold to do it. Create predictability around your monthly budget – including credit card and loan payments, build your savings reserves, and consider using alternative types of cards.



Theme for 2013: Women Inspiring Innovation Through Imagination: Celebrating Women in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics.

Although women now outnumber men in American colleges nationwide, the reversal of the gap is a very recent phenomenon. The fight to learn was a valiant struggle waged by many tenacious women, especially Black women.

I will highlight some facts about Black women and their contribution to mankind. "To God be all the glory" for Godly women

I thank God for the Black women that He has allowed to cross my path in life. Those women may not have done things that made great changes for mankind, but they made a big difference to me. Each lady left me with cherished memories and godly wisdom.

In 1978 the United States Post Office Department issued the first stamp to commemorate the contributions of African Americans females. You can log on the Internet to see the contribution each lady made to our society. The Harriet Tubman stamp was the first female in the Black Heritage Series, a 13¢ stamp was issued on February 1, 1079

Tubman (born Araminta Harriet Ross, 1820 – March 10,

1913) a Civil War Nurse and spy; Suffragist and Civil Rights activist. On June 2, 1863 she led the Union Army guerillas into Maryland and freed more than 700 slaves using the network of anti-slavery activist and safe houses known as the Underground Railroad which was organized on April 20, 1853. A devout Christian, Tubman ascribed the visions and vivid dreams to revelations from God.

The Mary McLeod Bethune stamp, a 22¢ on March 5, 1985. Bethune (July 10, 1875 − May 18, 1955) an educator and civil rights leader started a school for Black students in Daytona Beach, FL that eventually became Bethune-Cookman University. The school's educational quality far surpassed the standards of education for Black students.

dents and rivaled those of schools for Caucasian students. She was also known for being an advisor to President Franklin D. Roosevelt

The Sojourner Truth stamp, a 22¢ on February 4, 1986. Sojourner Truth (November 18, 1787 - November 26, 1883) was the self-given name, from 1843 onward, of Isabella Baumfree, an African-American abolitionist and women's rights activist. She was born into slavery in Swartekill, Ulster County, New York, but escaped with her infant daughter to freedom in 1826. After going to court to recover her son, she became the first Black woman to win such a case against a Caucasian man.

Her best-known extemporaneous speech on racial inequalities. "Ain't I a Woman?" was deBERNINI Sculpting in Clay

renew their loan by paying additional interest and fees. The report found that a typical customer renews their loan eight times.

The report also found anecdotal instances in which car-title lender marketing practices have lured consumers by advertising 25 percent interest per month for a two-week loan. The actual rate of interest, however, equates to 300 percent annual percentage rate (APR). And it's not as though 300 percent APR is an offsetting risk to the lender: Car-title loans are usually made for only a fraction of the vehicle's market value - approximately 26 percent.

When borrowers can no longer keep up with interest payments, cars are repossessed and yet another fee is added to the borrower's debt. On average, these repossession fees run in the range of \$350-\$400 or about half of the borrower's remaining loan balance. The report found that one in six consumers was charged expensive repossession fees.

It's easy to sum up the central problems with cartitle loans. As the authors write in the report, these loans "carry inherently unsuitable terms that cause already vulnerable borrowers to pay more in fees than they receive in credit while putting one of their most important assets at risk."

If you're thinking that there ought to be a law against this obviously predatory product, be sure to tell your state legislators. Most states with car-title loan laws either have no in-

terest rate caps, or authorize triple digit interest.

Tracking how these loans affect consumers is one thing; financial reforms are quite another. In this regard, the CFA -CRL report

calls for public policy actions at the state and federal levels.

In 2006, similar consumer protections were enacted to protect the military and their families. If Presi-

dent George W. Bush and Congress could agree to cap small loans at 36 percent annually for this consumer sector, it seems reasonable that the rest of us should be given the same protections. 
You know what success looks like from your office chair, but what's it like in other industries? In the new

NDG Book Review: The Art of Doing spotlights how superachievers do what they do

book *The Art of Doing* by Camille Sweeney and Josh Gosfield, you'll find out.

In your field of work, you know what it takes to get to the next level, then to the top. You assume it's the same in a lot of places, but what does it take to become a successful race car driver? How does one become a great major league ball player, a crossword puzzle creator, or a successful author?

Sweeney and Gosfield call those people "superachievers" and, after "months of research and over 100 hours of conversations," they noticed, despite the lack of similarity in jobs, that superachievers have ten strategies in common.



Superachievers, the authors say, show dedication. They're smart in their persistence. They know their community, they listen, and they know the power of story. They're willing to test

their theories, they never let their emotions run away from them, they're patient, and they're willing to evolve. Finally, they know that happiness and success are tied tight together.

As for advice, from game show winner Ken Jennings: "... enjoy the crazy experience..." and follow your bliss.

"Instill the 'WOW'," says Zappos' Tony Hsieh.

From 30 Rock's Alec Baldwin and Robert Carlock: "Good ideas come from anywhere, even from bad ideas."

Be a contrarian and grow old ungracefully. Know your values and focus on them. Love what you do. Seek out role models at every stage of your life. Be "a madman" when it comes to detail. Remember that you truly are what you eat. Work hard and devote yourself to that about which you're passionate. Reward talented people for risk-taking and don't let them leave.

Challenge yourself and your brain. Be likeable.

As business / motivational books go, *The Art of Doing* is a quirky little thing.

Authors Camille Sweeney and Josh Gosfield say in their introduction that they enjoyed finding and interviewing their superachievers, which is abundantly clear in every bubbly chapter. I also thought their format was fun: a short bio, followed by advice, then trivia about the person and their industry, all in just a few pages per chapter.

That makes this book a bit on the lighter (but very informational) side and, despite that there are some offthe-wall industries represented here, I think you'll find it useful in many ways.

This is the perfect book for those days when you wonder what it would be like to have a different job, because it gives you a peek, then a boost. So when you need exactly that, is the book to reach for.

Bell Wells-Barnett (July 16, 1862 – March 25, 1931) was an African American journalist, newspaper editor and, with her husband, newspaper owner Ferdinand L. Barnett, an early leader in the civil rights movement. She documented lynching in the United States, showing how it was often a way to con-

trol or punish Blacks who competed with Caucasians. She was active in the women's rights and the women's suffrage movement, establishing several notable women's organizations. Wells was a skilled and persuasive rhetorician. She received her education at Freedman's School, Rust Col-

lege and Fisk University. She also traveled internationally on lecture tours.

Elizabeth "Bessie" Coleman (January 26, 1892 – April 30, 1926) was an American civil aviator. She was the first female pilot of African American descent and the first person of African American descent to

hold an international pilot license. She born in Atlanta, Texas, the tenth of thirteen children. Her father was part Cherokee. Coleman began school at age six and had to walk four miles each day to her all-Black, one-room school. She was an excellent student and she loved to read; and established herself as an outstanding math student. She had a U. S. postage stamp issued in her honor on April 27, 1995.

Cathay Williams (September 1844 - 1892) was an American soldier. She was the first Black female to enlist, and the

only documented Black female to serve in the United States Army posing as a man under the pseudonym. She served as a Buffalo Solder of the 9th and 10th Calvary from 1866 to 1868.




