

Obama reignites push for gun legislation

WASHINGTON (NN-PA) – In the wake of highprofile gun violence in the nation's capital and Chicago, President Barack Obama told members of the Congressional Black Caucus and their dinner guests that he will renew his effort to persuade Congress to pass legislation toughening the nation's gun laws.

Speaking at the CBC Foundation Dinner Saturday night, Obama said, "We can't rest until all of our

children can go to school or walk down the street free from the fear that they will be struck down by a stray bullet. Just two days ago, in my hometown of Chicago, 13 people were shot during a pickup basketball game, including a 3-year-old girl. Tomorrow night I'll be meeting and mourning with families in this city who now know the same unspeakable grief of families in Newtown, and Aurora, and Tucson, and Chicago, and New Orleans, and all across the country - people

electrifying her opening address at the 7th Assembly of the World Movement for Democracy in Lima, Peru last fall, Gla-Changachirere described her upbringing in rural Mashonaland Central Province of Zimbabwe. "Like other peasant families," she recalled, "my family relies on farming and struggled to fund my education. Although they tried hard, it was not easy with society dictating that the girl child is not worth

investing in."

Glanis became involved in her crusade for women's rights as a result of her strong desire to receive an education. She defied the norms of a highly patriarchal society and enrolled in university where she joined the Student Representatives' Council as the only woman. She says she joined the student movement to fulfill her desire to say that "women are equal to our male counterparts and can equally represent their fellow students."

Glanis' activism had severe consequences, and she found herself in police incarceration on a number of occasions on the charge of "fighting for and representing student rights." But she was not to be intimidated, knowing that she was fighting for the right to education and the improvement of the lives of girls and young women in a free Zimbabwe.

Glanis, 30, became the founding director of the Institute for Young Women Development (IYWD) in The organization



provides a platform "where young women can organize and come together to live a life where they have a choice in how to lead their lives and have a sustainable livelihood." IYWD targets the most marginalized to participate: young women who live in rural communities and work in farming and mining.

"Our vision is to see a society in which young women are able to have access to resources and opportunities, to live a life of their choice," she said in a

whose loved ones were torn from them without headlines sometimes, or public outcry. But it's happening every single day.

President Obama, in his role as comforter-in-chief, addressed 4,000 people mourners Sunday night at the Marine Corps Barracks, several few blocks from the Navy Yard where Aaron Alexis, 34, a former Navy reservist with a history of mental problems. killed 12 people on Sept. 16 in Building 197 before being killed himself.

'Part of what wears on ... is the sense that this has happened before," President Obama said. "What wears on us, what troubles us so deeply, as we gather here today is this senseless violence that took place in the Navy Yard echoes other recent tragedies.'

Exasperated by inaction in Congress, the president said, "By now ... it should be clear that the change we need will not come from Washington, even when tragedy strikes Washington. Change will come the only way it ever has come, and that's from the American people."

Obama acknowledges that he faces an uphill battle getting gun legislation enacted

Despite strong support from President Obama, Vice President Joe Biden and relatives of the 20 first-graders and six educators killed in Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown, Conn. last December, legislation requiring expanded background checks failed to clear the Senate earlier this year.

"We fought a good fight earlier this year, but we came up short," Obama said at the "And that CBC dinner means we've got to get back up and go back at it. Because as long as there are those who fight to make it as easy as possible for dangerous people to get their hands on a gun, then we've got to work as hard as possible for the sake of our children. We've got to be ones who are willing to do more work to make it harder.'

The National Rifle Association (NRA) opposes legis-

Democrats in Congress are united in their push for gun legislation.

Public opinion polls show that support for stricter gun laws has fallen since the immediate aftermath of Sandy Hook. A Gallop poll conducted December 19-22 found 58 percent of the public favored tougher gun laws, 6 percent wanted less strict laws, 34 percent wanted no changes and 2 percent were undecided.

However, a Gallup poll conducted last week showed 49 percent favoring tougher gun laws, 13 percent less strict, 37 percent no changes and 2 percent undecided.

A June CBS News/New York Times poll showed a partisan divide, with 78 percent of Democrats, 30 percent of Republicans and 46 percent of independents favoring stricter laws. Only 2 percent of Democrats, 11 percent of Republicans and 12 percent of independents wanted the laws to be less strict. Most of the rest of those polled did not want any changes.

A study of Black homicides by the Violence Policy Center (VPC), a national nonprofit educational organization that conducts research and public education on violence in America, found the Black homicide rate is more than six times that of Whites.

Using FBI figures, the center said there were 6,469 Black homicide victims in 2010 The homicide rate among Black victims in the United States was 16.32 per 100,000, compared to a rate of 2.66 per 100,000 for

Both Obama and most lation that would require background checks for gun purchases

A new report by the Violence Policy Center titled, "Blood Money II – How the Gun Industry Funds the NRA," disclosed that members of the gun industry have donated between \$19.3 million and \$60.2 million to the NRA since 2005 Because the NRA is required to report only a range of donations, VPC said, it is impossible to determine exactly how much the organization receives from the gun industry.

In its first "Blood Money" report in 2011, the Violence Policy Center said the gun industry contributed between \$14.7 million and \$38.9 million to NRA, a figure that has increased considerably since then.

The latest "Blood Money" report, issued this month, states: "Despite the widespread cover of Blood Money's findings received after the Newtown shooting, the NRA's escalating efforts to bring in gun industry dollars, and the growing number of NRA programs 'sponsored' by members of the gun industry, to this day the NRA continues to falsely state on its webpage that the organization "is not affiliated with any firearm or ammunition manufacturers or with any businesses that deals in guns and ammunition."

In a press release, the Violence Policy Center said, "One of these 'corporate partners' is Freedom Group, manufacturer of the Bushmaster assault rifle used in the mass shooting of 20 children

and six educators at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown, Connecticut in December 2012. Cerberus Capital Management, which owns a 94 percent share in Freedom Group, pledged to sell its investment in the days following the Sandy Hook shooting but has yet to uphold its promise.

"After ramping up its financial support to a million dollars or more, Freedom Group's leadership was inducted into the NRA's Golden Ring of Freedom at the organization's annual meeting in May 2013. The Golden Ring of Freedom is reserved for those who have 'given gifts of cash totaling \$1,000,000 or more,' according to the NRA."

It continued, "A second inductee was Smith & Wesson, manufacturer of the assault rifle used in the July 2012 mass shooting in Aurora, Colorado that left 12 dead and 58 wounded. In a promotional video on the NRA's website, Smith & Wesson CEO James Debney explains, 'I think it's important for everybody to step up and support the NRA. They are our voice."

According to the new "Blood" report, high-capacity ammunition magazine manufacturers or vendors who contributed to the NRA included: Midway, with a contribution ranging between \$5 million and \$10 million. Those giving \$1 million to \$5 million were: Beretta USA Corporation, Brownells, Freedom Group, Springfield Armory, Inc., Smith & Wesson and Sturm, Ruger & Co.

Approximately 50 other gun companies or distributors including Winchester, Glock, Browning, Colt, and Remington - gave lesser amounts. Josh Sugarmann, author

of the study and executive director of the Violence Policy Center, said in a statement. "Less than five months after the tragedy in Newtown, while families and the entire community still mourned, the NRA was celebrating its financial ties to the manufacturer of the assault rifle used in the shooting. In the wake of declining household gun ownership, the NRA has turned to the funder of last resort: the gun industry itself."

Standard pantry items can provide quick relief, Parkland officials say

DALLAS - Although summer has officially ended, many of us continue to bask in outdoor activities well into the fall. And even though kids are well engrained into school, wasps, bees and even jellvfish are still lurking about waiting for the opportunity to sting. But, according to Parkland Health & Hospital System officials, look no further than your own pantry for quick and easy pain reliev-

Pantry essentials like meat tenderizer and baking soda can take the bite out of a wasp or bee sting, said Charise Thomason, Public Health Educator in the North Texas Poison Center, located at Parkland.

"A great way to soothe the burn of an insect bite or sting is to mix two parts baking soda with one part warm water to make a paste," Thomason said. "First, remove the stinger if you're stung by a bee with the blunt edge of a knife or credit card. Then gently spread the paste over the bug bite and let it dry."

If you're heading to the beach for the weekend, remember to pack the vinegar and meat tenderizer along with the flip flops and beach towels. Jellyfish stings can pack a powerful punch of pain, especially the notori-Portuguese O'War. In the event of a jellyfish sting, wash the area with vinegar. Sprinkle meat tenderizer or use the baking soda paste method. Rinse with hot water and apply vinegar to the site for 30 minutes. Shaving cream can

also be used to relieve the stinging sensation. Always call the North Texas Poison Center at 1.800.222.1222 to learn more tips and tricks, and to know how to spot the signs of an allergic reaction.

And what about our grandmothers' advice to butter up those minor burns? Not recommended, according to Sue Vanek,

The courthouse will reopen to the public on Oct. 1 for services such as citations or driving school pay-



ments but not for any services requiring an appearance before a judge. The Court will reopen to the public for all services on Thursday Oct. 3. Community Courts will reopen on Monday Oct. 7.

MetroPCS Dallas Marathon officials and members of the Dallas Police Department and Fire Department introduced the





Black media slighted as spending power exceeds \$1 trillion

WASHINGTON (NNPA) – Although annual Black spending is projected to rise from its current \$1 trillion to \$1.3 trillion by 2017, advertisers allot only 3 percent of their \$2.2 billion yearly budget to media aimed at Black audiences, a new Nielsen report has found.

The study, "Resilient, Receptive and Relevant: The African-American Consumer 2013 Report," was released at a news conference Thursday at the Congressional Black Caucus Legislative Weekend by Nielsen and the National Newspaper Publishers Association (NN-PA). The findings were released by Cheryl Pearson-McNeil, senior vice-president, public affairs and government relations for Nielsen, and Cloves Campbell, chairman of the NNPA and publisher of the Arizona In-

"Advertising expenditures geared specifically toward Black audiences reflected only three percent of advertising dollars spent," the report stated. "Advertisers spent \$75 billion on television, radio, internet, and magazine ads in 2012, with only \$2.24 billion of that spent with media focused on Black audiences.

The report said if consumption patterns dictated a company's advertising budget, then spending with the Black media should be:

- •44 percent higher on education and career web-
- •38 percent higher on streaming websites;
- •37 percent higher on television (with special emphasis on cable) and
- •15 percent higher on mobile phone advertising.

"The consumer insights this year are some of the most varied yet," said Pearson-McNeil. "From store loyalty, brand to

watched television networks, which mobile apps are most popular, a deep dive into how Blacks spend their digital time, and how companies can reach 10 million Black consumers by developing a southern regional strategy - this year's report is really a compelling read for both advertisers and marketers."

A 2011 study by Burrell Communications showed that 81 percent of Blacks believe that products advertised in Black media are more relevant to them.

Businesses that bypass the Black media, the report said, limit their potential growth

"Companies mistakenly believe there are no language barriers, that a general market 'one-size-fits-all' strategy is an effective way to reach African-Americans" the Nielsen study said. "Just the opposite is true."

Advertising by the top 20 companies increased by 2.5 percent between 2011 and 2012. The companies with the largest increases in spending with Black media were: Unilever (40.1 percent), PepsiCo (39.1 percent), Walmart (27.2 percent), the U.S. government (26.4 percent), L'Oreal (19.6 percent), Berkshire Hathaway (15.1 percent) and Comcast (13.2 percent).

Utilizing Black media makes good business sense, the report said.

"By aligning additional marketing support and more focused strategies using media sources such as Black newspapers, Black radio, Black online sites and other media outlets trusted and relied on by Blacks for their unfiltered information, companies can develop more culturally relevant messages...." the report stated.

It noted that Blacks over index in certain categories, including health and beauty aids, unprepared meat, frozen seafood, feminine hygiene, women's fragrances, and detergents.

"An examination of African-Americans' overall category uses reveals some notable and perhaps newly discovered behavioral distinctions between Blacks and the Total Market," the report found. "Until we do a better job as consumers in the choices we make and invest in companies that invest in us, we are not going to have any changes," said Pearson-Mc-

Additionally, African-Americans continue to be resilient in their role as early adopters of technology as 14 percent are more likely to spend time on Telecom/Internet Services sites."

"Blacks are voracious media users and leaders when it comes to setting pop culture trends. Nowhere is this more prevalent than in Blacks' television habits where Blacks watch 37% more television than any other group, spending seven hours and 17 minutes per day viewing TV, compared to five hours and 18 minutes of total viewing for Total Market," the Nielsen study stated.

It continued, "Black women, especially those 18-49, tend to be heavier viewers than their male counterparts. Not surprisingly, media outlets dedicated to Black audiences have a higher composition of Black viewers, which should be of interest to businesses who incorporate media buys into their marketing strategies."

Blacks outpace Whites in buying smartphones. The Nielsen report found that 71 percent of Blacks own smartphones, compared to 62 percent of the total population. Most African Americans prefer Androids (73 percent) over iPhones (27 percent).

Although a lot of attention is being placed on the growth of Latinos in the U.S., the Black population, which now stands at 43 million people, grew 64 percent faster than the rest of the country since 2000,

Blacks are also likely to the study said. The average age is 35, three years younger than the overall population; 53 percent of Blacks are under the age of

> Significantly, 73 percent of Whites and 67 percent of Latinos identified Blacks as the driving force for popular culture.



CC: Thank you. I believe that it is important to remember the people that paved the way for you. They are definitely my role models. I think about them every day.

KW: How would you describe the primary mission of the Black Press?

CC: I believe that our mission is to deliver the news of and about the Black Community to our respective markets. The most important aspect our mission is that we deliver that news from the black perspective

KW: What's at the top of your agenda as you start your

new term?

CC: My main focus will be, as it was two years ago, to continue to integrate the digital platform to our member papers' portfolios. However, we still want to maintain our strong print presence, as well as to continue to reach out to younger readers.

KW: Do you consider mainstream papers as your competition?

CC: Not at all. Mainstream papers biggest competition is television. They are competing for the instant gratification customer. Black newspapers are a niche market and black consumers are now being targeted by major corporations for their dollars.

KW: Do you think the NNPA publications get their fair share of corporate advertising dollars?

CC: Definitely not! We have been making that argument for several decades. As a matter of fact, two years ago we partnered with the Nielsen Ratings Research Company to do a study of African-American consumers and it has been very useful in our advertising sales call and marketing efforts.

•Seniors are less likely to report fraud because they don't know where to report it, don't realize they've been scammed, or are too ashamed at having been duped – possibly fearing they won't be trusted to manage their own finances going forward.

•When elderly victims do report crimes, they often make poor witnesses because of faulty memory.

•Seniors are more susceptible to products promising increased wealth, cognitive function, virility, physical conditioning, anti-cancer properties and so on.

Here's a roundup of common telemarketing sc-ams targeting seniors and how you can avoid them:

Be wary, even if callers appear legitimate. Caller ID

"spoofers" pretending to represent your bank, credit card company or government agencies may try to trick you into revealing personal information under the pretext of fixing a security breach. When in doubt, hang up and contact the organization yourself.

Other common telemarketing scams include:

•You've supposedly won a free prize but are asked to pay for handling, postage or taxes. By law, you never have to pay for any legitimate prize.

•Get-rich-quick schem-es, like those involving Nigerian princes trying to smuggle funds out of their country using your bank account in exchange for a cut of the amount.

•The "Grandparent Scam," where someone pretend-

ing to be your grandchild calls in a panic, claiming to have been arrested or injured (often abroad) and asking you to wire them money – and not tell their parents because they're embarrassed.

•Soliciting funds for fake charities, especially after natural disasters.

•Companies offering seniors free medical equipment or services. After you provide your Medicare number, they forge a doctor's signature and bill Medicare for unneeded goods or services you never actually receive.

•Some particularly brazen thieves will even offer to help you recover money you've lost to other scammers (who are often part of the same operation).

Although direct telephone

contact is common, scammers also use mailers, email, texts and advertisements to lure potential victims into contacting them for further information. A few tip-offs these offers – whatever the channel – might be bogus:

•The offer sounds too good to be true.

•High-pressure sales tactics – they won't take no for an answer have sensible-sounding answers for your every question or hesitation.

•You must make a decision "right now" because the offer will expire soon.

•Claims that you are one of just a few people eligible for the offer.

•Your credit card number is requested for verification. Never provide credit card or other personal information by phone, letter or email unless you made the initial contact.

•You are urged to provide money quickly and not given time to consider the offer.

•There is no risk. All investments have some risk, except for U.S. Government obligations.

•They refuse to provide detailed written information.

•You are asked to trust the telemarketer. Like your mother always said, "Don't trust

strangers."

The Federal Trade Commission (www.ftc.gov) has a Scam Alert Blog that exposes the latest scams, as well as a site where you can file a complaint if a business doesn't make good on its promises or cheats you out of your money.

Civic Space Initiative video about her life and work. "Young women are not seen as equal citizens," she said. "We don't have a right to human dignity as our boys or male counterparts do."

IYWD has played an important role in calling for peaceful, democratic elections, and creating guaranteed spaces that allow for the participation of all Zimbabweans in the political system.


"The idea of mobilizing young women is to ask [the question], 'How can we challenge these systems that are [preventing] us from being who we are?" Glanis said. "In the eyes of

society, including church and even close relatives, I was being a 'rebellious girl child.' I was defying societal and religious norms."

In addition to educating young women and providing them a platform to participate in Zimbabwean politics—two of their young women ran for office during the 2008 elections—Glanis promotes entrepreneurialism among young women to help them build a fiscal life that allows them to support themselves.

"I wouldn't say I'm a social worker," Glanis said. "There's a certain drive that tells me I need to actively do something in order to bring about the transformation that I need to see. It's important for our society to realize that when they invest in young women, they invest in their community and therefore their nation."

Your mind's made up.

There's no going back once you've made a choice between Door Number One or Door Number Two. You're not a waffler, you weighed pros and cons, and you're confident you picked correctly. Or not.

Indeed, the worst part about making a decision can be the regret that's possible at the end of the choice. And in the new book *Knocking on Heav*-

Knocking on Heaven's Door: The Path to a Better Way of Death is a conversation-starter

en's Door by Katy Butler, a seemingly no-brainer decision tears a family apart.

Jeff Butler cheated death many times.

As a child, he narrowly missed dying in a car accident. In World War II, he lost an arm, but not his life. And in November 2001, at age 79, he suffered a stroke that nearly killed him. A year later, he received a pacemaker

And that, says his daughter Katy, kept him alive but didn't "prevent his slide into dementia, incontinence, near-muteness, misery, and helplessness."

Jeff and his wife Val were forward thinkers. He was a college professor. She was a perfectionist with fierce drive. Weake aware his dir he'd '

They had been "in control of their lives, and they did not expect to lose control of their deaths"

But that's exactly what happened: as Jeff's health continued to decline, his abilities

dwindled and his cognizance weakened—all of which he was aware. He indicated dismay at his diminished life and said that he'd "unfortunately" lived too long.

On the other side of the country, Katy Butler worried. She'd always been closer to her father than to her mother, but arguments and old hurts continued to sting. Still, she flew home to Connecticut to help because she was, after all, their daughter – statistically, the one who bore the brunt of parenting a parent.

But as Jeff's dementia worsened, so did Val's tolerance and her health. She was "stoic," but impatient, snappish and exhausted, and only accepted outside help when she became overwhelmed. Butler says she knew her mother "clouted" her father, and shouted at him in frustrated anger.

By this time, Butler was convinced that the pacemaker her father had wasn't the medical miracle it was meant to be. And she learned that pacemakers could be turned off...

So much went through my mind as I read this beautiful, emotionally brutal book.

With sorrow, grace, and growing exasperation, author Katy Butler writes of her father's long, messy death; her mother's quiet, dignified passing; and the parallel story of how modern medicine, drug

companies, and government rules promoted the former.

That's a lot of hard reading, made gentler with Butler 's Buddhist values and serenity. And yet, it's not easy to avoid outrage as she points out the unfairness of aging, the cruelty of physical decline, and the knowledge that those – and the surety of caretaking – are somewhat inevitable for many Baby Boomers today.

This is a stunning book, truthful and its dignified, and it could be a conversation-starter. If there's a need for that in your family – or if you only want to know what could await you – then read *Knocking on Heaven's Door*. You won't regret it.
