Dr. Ben Carson: 'Gifted Hands,' **Foot in Mouth**

(NNPA) Dr. Ben Carson became the darling of conservatives earlier this year by stridently attacking the Affordable Care Act with President Barack Obama sitting just a few feet away. Carson, who was serving as the keynote speaker at the National Prayer Breakfast at the White House, said,

"Here's my solution: When a person is born, give him a birth certificate, an electronic medical record, and a health savings account to which money can be contributed pretax – from the time you're born 'til the time you die. When you die, you can pass it on to your family members, so that when you're 85 years old and you got six diseases, you're not trying to spend up everything. You're happy to pass it on and there's nobody talking about death panels.





Miscalculating Multiculturalism in America

(NNPA) Given the political gridlock in Washington that's pushed the country to the brink of economic calamity and caused needless distress to millions, one might think America has rarely been more polarized, more "dis-united." Actually, the opposite is true. American society - in terms of expanding democracy to all of its citizens - has never been more unified. That's why the country seems so dis-united.

That assertion seems contradictory - unless you view the current scene through the prism of that adage and basic principal of chemistry: every action provokes a reaction.

Accordingly, the budget and debt-ceiling crisis the Republican Party engineered this fall is just the latest expression of the conservative movement's virulent reaction to Barack Obama's presidency and the changes in American society that emerged and coalesced to make that extraordinary breakthrough happen.

Those changes principally stem from the growing numbers of Black Americans, Hispanic Americans and Asian Americans. Their political activism and joining within the Democratic Party with gays and lesbians, and politically progressive White men and women have in little more than a decade transformed American politics from its old overwhelmingly Black-and-White affair.

That multiracial, multicultural coalition twice produced electoral success for the Democratic Party, underscoring the fact that dramatic demographic changes have come to fruition far sooner than the conventional wisdom had predicted less than two decades ago.

It's also produced something else: more proof that multiculturalism works.

If you'll recall, that wasn't supposed to be true. Instead, from the early 1990s well into the first term of George W. Bush's presidency, plenty of centrist and conservative scholars and nundits sneered that multiculturalism was just so much empty ethnic boasting and advocacy of self-segregation, pushed by "romantic ideologues and unscrupulous hucksters."

Those specific words and more general assertions come from the late Arthur M. Schlesinger Jr.'s 1991 bestseller, The Disuniting of America: Reflections on a Multicultural Society.

The title, of course, tells the tale. Schlesinger, a former adviser to President John F. Kennedy and a celebrated historian, characterized multiculturalism as a pernicious, divisive force that threatened the longheld, traditional vision of the nation as "one people" united by a common culture. He was particularly harsh toward Afrocentric educa-

were indigent who don't have any money we can make contributions to their HSA [Health Savings Account] each month because we already have this huge pot of money. Instead of sending it to some bureaucracy, let's put it in their HSAs. Now they have some control over their own health care."

Predictably, the Right wing rushed to embrace him. Rush Limbaugh, Sean Hannity and the crew at Fox News were ecstatic that a prominent Black neurosurgeon shared their world view. Jonah Goldberg, a columnist for the Right-wing National Review, compared Carson to racial apologist Booker T. Washington. David Graham, writing in The Atlantic, called him Herman Cain without the "personal skeletons." And the conservative Wall Street Journal ran an op-ed under the headline, "Ben Carson for President."

Carson became a paid contributor to Fox News, was hired to write a weekly column for the Right-wing Washington Times, and became in demand as a speaker at the annual Conservative Political Action Conference (CPAC) and any national event that attracts more than three conservatives.

Professionally, Carson is no dumb man. He earned his undergraduate degree from Yale University and his M.D. from the University of Michigan. At the age of 33, he became director of pediatric neurosurgery at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, the youngest major division director in the school's history.

In 1987, he led a 70member surgical ream that separated twins who had been joined at the back of the head. After the successful 22-hour surgery, Carson gained national recognition. His autobiography, Gifted Hands: The Ben Carson Story, was published in 1992. The book recounts how his mother, Sonya, reared him and his older brother, Curtis, after she and her husband, Robert, divorced when Ben was 8 vears old. In 2009. TNT released a television movie with the same title as his book, starring Cuba Gooding, Jr. as Ben Carson. In 2008, George W. Bush presented Carson with the Presidential Medal of Freedom

Carson has made several controversial remarks after his appearance at the White House. In March, he said on Fox TV: "Marriage is between a man and a woman. No group, be they gays, be they NAMBLA

[North American Man/Boy Love Association], be they people who believe in bestiality, it doesn't matter what they are. They don't get to change the definition."

Under pressure, Carson withdrew as commencement speaker for the Johns Hopkins School of Medicine. He also apologized for "not the best choice of words," called his critics racist, and then apologized again.

Of all of his outrageous comments, his latest one ranks among the most egre-

Speaking at a Voter Values Summit, Carson said, "I have to tell you that Obamacare is, really, I think, the worst thing that's happened to this nation since slavery. It was never about healthcare, it was about control?

First, the Affordable Care Act does what its proper title implies - it makes health care affordable to millions of people, including the uninsured. If making insurance more affordable, not allowing insurance companies to reject people with pre-existing conditions and allowing children to remain on their parents' insurance policies until they are 26 years old isn't about healthcare, the esteemed neurosurgeon

doesn't know the definition of healthcare.

Second, any idiot knows that having access to healthcare is not worse than slavery

Enslaved Africans had no rights, as the Supreme Court ruled in its 1857 Dred Scott decision, which the white man was bound to respect." They were brutalized, degraded, whipped, killed, and raped at the whim of the slave master. Marriage was not recognized and the slave codes in various states made it illegal to teach Blacks to read or write.

The Affordable Health Care Act is worse than that?

It's a ridiculous comparison. At the rate he is going, Carson's photograph will be slapped on boxes of rice. Dr. Ben will be more appropriately known as Uncle Ben

The Shutdown and the Refuge of School food

For many kids, school food provides the main source of nutrition they receive on a daily basis. During the government shutdown, this program is especially critical for our children due to cuts in the SNAP and other supplemental nutrition programs as well as the sudden disappearance of millions of paychecks. But even our school lunch program is in jeopardy. Some school districts are now reporting that if the shutdown is not resolved by November 1, their free and reducedprice lunch program will take a major hit. Suddenly the fractures and nuttiness that pervades Washington may result in hundreds of



thousands of hungry children

Make no mistake: The school breakfast and lunch programs feed millions of children who really need it. During the economic decline, the number of children registering for the National School Lunch Program has climbed – up 25 percent in some states.

And it's not just the ability to provide food, but what kids actually get to eat at school, which fortunately has been improving. Over the past year, 50 million school kids saw the promise of a healthier lunch menu thanks to the "Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act." The program requires schools to serve more fresh

fruits, vegetables and whole grains as well as more sources of lean protein, and encourages school gardens and nutrition education programs.

New federal regulations for school lunches and vending machines start taking effect next year. Under the new rules, vending machine food has to be healthier, and contain mostly fruits, vegetables, protein, or dairy or contain at least 50 percent whole grains. There is an outright ban on soda and caps on calories that come from sweetening additives, saturated fat, sodium, and sugar.

Thankfully obesity rates are starting to decline. The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) studied the issue and found the obesity rate for poor children fell in 18 states and the Virgin Islands between 2008 and 2011. The CDC reports that new nutrition standards played a role in many states, including Mississippi which saw its childhood obesity rate drop by 13 percent in only five years.

We all know that fresh food, if prepared properly, delivers more nutrients, reduces carbon emissions, connects schools to their communities and benefits the local economy. Studies have proven that what kids are eating impacts their test scores; their ability to concentrate; the levels of school violence; and students' good feelings about themselves

Given the impact that the shutdown is having on

our country's poor children and their ability to eat, it is somewhat ironic that this week begins National School Lunch Week, which runs from October 14th to October 18th this year. During this time of government shutdown, we are reminded what a vital program school lunch is and how it can be transformed to better meet nutritional needs. The week-long observance, which is a largely untapped opportunity to continue the badly needed conversation about our children's health, creates a nationwide platform to continue the revolution that has been started.

National School Lunch Week also has me thinking way, way back to chocolate milk, square pizza slices (that needed a buzz saw to cut), rock hard tater tots, and a heaping side order of ketchup. Nostalgia?

I know I am dating myself, but I also vaguely remember my parents and others getting fired up about the controversial proposal about what constituted a vegetable for school lunches. It all started like this. The Ominibus Reconciliation Acts of 1980 and 1981 reduced the budget of the Federal School Lunch Program by 25 percent! So, the USDA Food and Nutrition Service issued a proposal to allow school food services directors to expand (or better yet, cheapen) which food items fit the guidelines for "vegetables". The proposal went as far as listing pickle relish, as an example of a substitute for veggies.

Needless to say, this proposal sparked considerable outrage among parents, educators and public health officials. The most well know condiment, ketchup, became the movement's poster child for "veggies gone bad." Finally, the proposal to upgrade condiments into the elite realm of the vegetable food group was withdrawn before the end of 1981 and never implemented.

It's a new day! But, it's a long time coming.

That incident, more than 30 years ago, gave rise to a movement that has helped to lay the groundwork for today's huge steps forward in school nutrition. Parents have been speaking out and, all over the country state, local, and schoolbased polices have given rise to salad bars, school gardens, and healthier options in the lunch line. Even better, this year, new national guidelines are taking effect from coast to coast.

The Healthy Hunger Free Kids Act of 2011 has made way for lunchroom standards that require more whole grains and double the amount of fruits and vegetables! Many people thought the new guidelines would be a heavy or impossible lift for schools; but parents remained vigilant in speaking out, taking action, and letting all decision-makers know that better nutrition in schools is critical and doable. And, we were right! Last week, the USDA announced that so far 80 percent of schools are serving healthier meals that meet the upgraded nutrition standards.

Like all parents, I hope that the images of poor quality school lunches that are low on nutrition and high on fat, salt, and sugar become extinct. I'd also like to limit leg warmers to re-enactments of Flash Dance.

North Texas Women Crusade to Get 100,000 Signatures of Women Who Pledge to Say No to Married Men

Dallas, TX - Chanel Price knows all too well the trap of dating married men. She has chronicled her journey and lessons learned in a new book The Mistress Trap. Her experience has lead her to launch a crusade to bring awareness to a culture of increasing infidelity.

Thomas taught Algebra I and II for 10 years. She then joined GISD in 2005 as a teacher at Sachse High School before becoming an administrator at SGHS one year later. Though Thomas is no longer in the classroom, she has not lost her passion for teaching. In addition to her day job, she also instructs an online Algebra class at the University of Phoenix.

"I just love math," Thomas said. "I did not want to lose that passion because I was no longer in the classroom."

Keeping her fire for education alive, Thomas also remains passionate about her students.

"They are the reason I am here," she said. "I want to make sure they graduate from high school and have a successful future. I always tell the kids

that the biggest gift they can give me is to come back several years after graduating to show me successful they have become."

Thomas received her Educator of the Year award at the NAACP Garland's Freedom Fund brunch Sept. 14. President Ricky McNeal recognized her with a commemorative trophy.

A world languages teacher, Thelma Elizabeth Page Richardson (1911-1996) ma-de history with a gro-undbreaking lawsuit filed Dec. 23, 1942, with the Negro Teachers' Alliance of Dallas. With assistance from NA-ACP Chief Counsel Thurgood Marshall, she sought to equalize the salaries of black and white

Dallas teachers who had the same qualifications.

Her goal was achieved and salaries were made equal in the years that followed the successful lawsuit. Throughout the remainder of her career, Richardson's reputation as a civil rights pioneer grew to match her stature as a muchrevered teacher at Lincoln, Booker T. Washington and North Dallas high schools.

accept cash.

According to its appbased website, debit and prepaid credit cards are not accepted either.

That means black car service is out of reach for a number of our members since debit and prepaid cards may be their only credit cards.

Many have regular cell phones; not smart phones, which mean they can't even order the leading "appbased" black car service.

Unfortunately, people of color know a lot about profiling. From redlining loans to walking at your own risk in upscale neighborhoods, "profiling" to us conjures up ugly historical barriers.

Our history is full of documented profiling; and profiling, whether done secretly or done in plain sight, has not been good for us.

Simply stated, our community leadership must proactively monitor what happens with the taxi versus black car tug-of-war. Then we must speak with a clear,

strong and unified voice to our elected officials.

This issue is important because a number of our worshippers and community residents use vehicles for hire (primarily DART and its paratransit services) in their daily routine.

If left to fight it out on their own terms, non-transit related commercial 'vehicles for hire' will soon leave or severely cut back service to Southern Dallas, an area where about 45 percent of Dallas' population lives.

Why are we sending a clarion call to those who represent us to do their duty in regulating balanced 'for hire' vehicle service?

Because if we remain silent, "for hire" services: taxis and black cars; will redeploy their vehicles above Interstate 30, focusing on Uptown and DFW area airports.

Right now if we were to grade taxi companies serving Southern Dallas, we would give taxis a service to community grade of "C".

If we were to grade black cars for hire, we would give an "I" for "incomplete" because there simply are not enough black cars serving our community.

Black cars go to more affluent areas because that is where they believe the big tips and higher fares are. As an unregulated for hire service, they can continue to ignore our community without penalty.

If the city does not force all service providers to play by the same regulated rules, finding a taxi in Southern Dallas may become as rare as finding a black car for hire. Dallas City Council can fix this.

It is our prayer that Mayor Mike Rawlings and the entire Dallas City Council will continue to help Dallas 'Grow South' by providing uniform vehicle for hire service both North and South of Interstate 30.

It matters to the two of us. It matters to our organizations. It matters to our members. And most of all, it matters to our already underserved Southern Dallas community.

Let's really grow south!





What's in our Shopping Carts?

(NNPA) With a current buying power of \$1 trillion, manufacturers and marketers should be paying careful attention to the shopping patterns of African-American consumers.

The latest report on Black consumers, Resilient, Receptive and Relevant: The African-American Consumer 2013 Report, illustrates how much of that spending breaks down: Our annual retail spending makes up 87 percent of the total market retail spending, while retail spending for the Total Market accounts for 70 percent. This is a narrow gap in retail spending between Blacks and the Total Market, which indicates our importance as Black consumers. We shell out 30 percent more of our annual income than the Total Market as well.

So now that you have a glimpse as to where the bulk of our household income is spent, let's take a look at where that spending occurs. Annually, African-Americans, make 154 shopping trips, which is eight trips more than other groups. We average, 20 trips to dollar stores, seven trips more; 15 trips to convenience/gas stores, which is two more than any other group and 15 trips to drug stores, which is one more than any other groups. Less time is spent at grocery stores, with three fewer trips. The exception to grocery store shopping, though, is with Blacks who earn upwards of \$100,000 annually. We also make three fewer trips to warehouse stores and two fewer trips to mass merchandisers than the Total Market. However, more upper-income Blacks (73 percent) shop at warehouse clubs than non-Blacks annually.

The Centers for Disease Control has identified a phenomenon specific to some of our communities known as "food deserts" or "retail deserts." We all know you won't find some large chains in some urban areas. And, some existing grocery stores simply don't carry the freshest, most nutritious foods. This might explain the occurrences and store prefer-

ences of food shopping trips in the African-American community. As the data also shows, African Americans tend to frequent retail stores located in our communities. Consequently, there is an opportunity for expansion of both affordable, quality product variety and actual stores in our neighborhoods. In an effort to try to attack this "food desert" trend, the Whole Foods chain, plans to build a store in Chicago's Englewood neighborhood.

Another retail area that's big for us is ethnic health and beauty care products – I know, no shocker there, right? We spend more than nine times more than any other demographic on Ethnic Hair and Beauty Aids. Sure, of course there are other hair

care products on the shelves, but those products are not identified as ethnic, but they can lead to tremendous market growth opportunities, as Blacks' hair care spending within traditional CPG retailers is underdeveloped compared to the total market. In fact, 46 percent of Black households shop at Beauty Supply Stores and have an average annual total spend of \$94 on products at these stores.

Among other edible and non-edible products, the re-



tional curricula, which some Blacks advocated, and a bilingual approach to educating Hispanic children proposed by some Hispanic educators and activists, claiming that they would undermine the efforts of the masses of these minority groups to fully reap the benefits of their American citizenship.

Schlesinger readily acknowledged that the United States had long fallen short of living up to its heroic ideals about tolerance and

freedom, especially for people of color. But he declared that the great changes that had occurred since the 1960s should inspire in all Americans "a common adherence to the ideals of democracy and human rights."

It's richly ironic to recall against the backdrop of the last five years yesteryear's heated warnings that multiculturalism would divide the nation into segregated, warring racial and ethnic camps.

The reality is that multi-

culturalism has been the banner under which all these groups have found a way to pursue their fierce desire to integrate more securely into the American mainstream. And their realizing that common bond has led them to put aside whatever points of potential tension Schlesinger and others had predicted would lead to hostil-

Instead, the divisive forces in today's American society are those Whites who've camped in the Republican Party and its even more conservative faction, the Tea Party. They resent having to share on a more equal basis the decisionmaking authority and resources of the land with Americans of color.

The recently published book, Change They Can't Believe In: The Tea Party and Reactionary Politics in America by scholars Christopher Parker and Matt A. Barreto, provides fresh data on how intolerant GOP members generally, and particularly those who support the Tea Party, are of those who hold different beliefs or opinions. Their study also shows that the "reactionary conservatives" of the Tea Party have a "thin" commitment to democracy. Instead, they place a much higher value on getting their way.

These findings, as important as they are, are no surprise to those who've followed the GOP's divideand-conquer political strategy during the last four decades. Of course, the stark

example of that anti-democratic attitude is the government shutdown and debtceiling crisis it's forced on all Americans

It's too bad Arthur Schlesinger didn't understand that when he warned Americans of the danger of dis-unity from the Left, he was looking in the wrong direction.

port shows that on average, African Americans also purchase more unprepared meat and frozen seafood, dry vegetables and grains, refrigerated juices and drinks (in addition to those that non-perishable and can have an extended shelf life), feminine hygiene products, fresheners and deodorizers And that's just a few of the categories that we tend to over-index. On the other hand, the insights show that we spend less money on the range of dairy products (milk, yogurt, etc.) on the edible side and this could be because many of us are lactose-intolerant; and categories like hair care (not to be confused with Ethnic HABA), some magazines with selected titles plus lawn and garden products round out the non-edible list.

African-Americans are brand loyal consumers, but like other consumer groups; we enjoy value (e.g. better per-item pricing) and spend 18 percent of our retail dollars on private label brands. You know – the store brands I am always fascinated by how varied different groups'

preferences tend to be. For instance, in the private label category, disposable diapers rank as the most popular item for us; but they rank fifth on the store brand list of White non-Hispanics. Again, this is an opportunity for marketers who are paying at-

shared with Kafele that they literally raised their children on the contents of this book

At the core of A Black Parent's Handbook is the chapter that addresses reading for success. Kafele has argued for the past 22 years that in education, we can have the best schools, best curriculum, best teachers and best teaching strategies, but if Black children are not being exposed to who they are, both historically and culturally, then we are spinning our wheels at best.

He argues that when Black children are exposed to "who they are," we increase the probability exponentially that they will have the will to strive for excellence because by exposing them to "their we are essentially helping them to develop a

purpose for learning, rooted in the greatness of who they are historically.

Kafele says, "I want them to see and understand where they stand along the continuum of history to help them to better understand their roles in life moving forward."

(NNPA) I keep hoping that I can stop writing about the federal government shutdown/lockout. Hopefully, when you read this, it will all be over. But even when it's over, it won't be

Case in point: I have a friend who works for the federal government. What she and many of her colleagues are wondering, in addition to when the shutdown/lockout will end, is whether there will be more of these idiotic Republican

implications are actually quite sobering. If, as it appears, that Tea Party Republicans have decided to advance their agenda by creating a series of crises, this raises questions about the ability of federal workers to remain confident that there is actually a future for them in public service.

Think about it for a moment. Even with the apparent commitment by Congress to make whole federal workers for their lost wages, the reality is that the banks are not giving bor-

rowers a free pass; I know of no mortgage company that is allowing federal workers to hold back on their mortgage payments until the end of the shutdown: I am unfamiliar with food stores providing resources to families on the assumption that they will be reimbursed when this shutdown/lockout is over.

As a result, each federal worker and contract employee must reflect on whether they can actually afford to continue to work in the federal service. How many more times will there be such lockouts? What sorts of plans can any federal worker make for the future?

There are already discussions in the mainstream media of how the shutdown/lockout has affected research being conducted in various federal scientific agencies and departments. This will become a chronic problem leading to an even-

between 1942 and 1943 in

German-occupied Poland during World War II. He survived after helping a small group of Jewish prisoners overpower their guards on Oct. 14, 1943 an act of daring that allowed 200 of Sobibor's 600 slave laborers to escape

(though only 50 escapees

survived the war).

Before the legendary revolt. Bialowitz had been tasked with helping unload the transports of Jews arriving at Sobibor. "I helped them out of the trains with all their baggage. My heart was bleeding knowing that in half an hour they would be reduced to ashes," he told the BBC. In many cases, Bialowitz also had to remove dead passengers who had succumbed to the Nazis' unimaginably inhumane transport conditions.

"Philip Bialowitz is one of the few people alive today who can speak with firsthand knowledge of the Nazi extermination process in eastern Poland," says SMU Embrey Human Rights Program Director Rick Halperin. He believes SMU students should embrace this unique opportunity and man

"This generation of Holocaust survivors will pass away in the years ahead, so this generation of SMU students will be the last group of young people who can ever speak with, and hug, such special people," Halperin says.

After the event, Bialowitz will sell and sign copies of his 2010 book, A Promise at Sobibór: A Jewish Boy's Story of Revolt and Survival in Nazi-Occupied Poland.

humble us. That is the blessing of trials in a life.



They came with diagrams. but that didn't help. Online information was no better, you were making a mess of things, and about ready to scream. You needed clarification. You needed simple answers. You wanted someone to show you what to do.


You needed a leader. So why can't it be you? In the

The Rejected Stone by Reverend Al Sharpton is a good look at leadership

new book "The Rejected Stone" by Reverend Al Sharpton, you'll see how it could happen.

Every once in awhile – especially when he's somewhere unexpected - Reverend Al Sharpton looks around, surprised and pleased. He's been working for social justice and civil rights since he was nine years old, and there are many things he never thought he'd see in his lifetime.

He admits that he's come a long way since his Tawana Brawley days. He's lost weight and gained insight, changed his outlook and his mind on issues. He's become a leader because the Black community needs more of those.



Great leaders, he says, don't become leaders by accident. They know where they're going and they know how they're going to get there. They don't let their past deter them; they don't blame their childhood or neighborhood for their shortcomings. They understand that successful African Americans became successful because of community, not family. They listen to the giants of history; they have mentors and they mentor.

Leaders are true to themselves, but they understand that they must be "different, better, more" than those around them. They know their own strengths and don't pretend to be something they're not. They've defined themselves, they ask for what they need, and they aren't afraid to "be big."

Successful leaders, he says, are all-encompassing. If you are against injustice, then you must be against all injustice. It's "hypocrisy" to pick and choose.

To be a leader, you must focus and commit to a cause. You must understand that religion isn't something you merely preach, it's what you practice. And, to be a leader, you must know when it's time

In all that author Reverend Al Sharpton has done in his life, considering the people he's known (Michael Jackson and James Brown, for example, both of whom he writes about at length), and the issues that have made him front-page news, who would've expected wideeved amazement at his current life? Yes, that's what you'll see in the first chapter of "The Rejected Stone," and it's good.

From his roots in Brooklyn to his current activism, Sharpton weaves his own experiences in with advice on becoming a leader, reaching for one's "blessings," and being an agent for justice. Readers may be pleasantly surprised to see humility here, too; Sharpton occasionally writes with what seems like hindsight tinged with regret, which truly adds to the magnetism of his words.

I liked that; I liked the lighter, no-nonsense tone of this helpful, easy-to-read book; and I think if you know someone with potential – teen or adult – it's what they need: "The Rejected Stone" could be a push in the right direction.

from the enemy. He will calm your soul and be your shelter always.

There is a timing that is ideal for every situation and every trial that God provides for Christians. Jesus understood the importance of timing. When He performed His first healing miracle He instructed the man He healed with leprosy to not tell anvone.

Now that would be difficult - not to share being healed from leprosy with your friends who have known you and your condition. He could not keep the secret.

How often has Jesus not been able to move in your situation because you have failed to honor the right timing of the situation to be useful to Him? Perhaps you have moved ahead when you were not supposed to move. In the Old Testament, David was fighting the Philistines. He won the first battle, but they were coming against him again.

He inquired of God and God said, "Go to battle, but not until you hear the marching in the balsam trees" (2 Sam. 5:23). There was a strategic timing associated with his actions.

"To every thing there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven:' Ecclesiastes 3:1.

tual grinding to a halt of major work coupled with the exit of federal employ-

Did I say "eventual?" There has actually been an exit underway. As federal workers have been demonized by the political Right and treated as scapegoats, through antics like sequestration, we have seen federal workers going for early retirements or other means of exiting the system.

One has to ask whether it is in the interests of the people of this country to lose talented, long-term employees from the federal government. The impact will ultimately be the increase in contract employees who will be paid less; have less secure employment; few, if any benefits...

That's right. If that sounds familiar, that is the objective of the Tea Party Republicans.


