## Ray B. Shackelford

When it comes to voting, it is often said that "every vote counts" and that adage really rang true for Houston native Ray B. Shackelford, as he was recently elected as the 10th National President of the National Urban League Young Professionals (NULYP) by a narrow ONE vote margin at the National Urban League (NUL) Annual Convention in Indianapolis. Again, every vote counts!

NULYP is a National Urban League volunteer



auxiliary that targets young professionals from the ages of 21 to 40, who seek to empower their communities and change lives through the Urban League Movement. NULYP's mission is to support the Urban League

Movement through volunteerism, philanthropy and membership development.

Since its inception, NU-LYP has worked to support their Affiliates and to develop a leadership pipeline for the NUL. Over the years, the NULYP's role has expanded to a point where they have provided leadership in every space, while helping to bridge generational gaps and solve problems that have plagued the African American community for decades.

Shackelford was elected to serve as the new leader of NULYP, which was ironically unveiled at the NUL Annual Conference in Houston back in 1999.

Fast forward to 2019, and we find a Houstonian at the helm of the very organization that was launched in his home city of Houston exactly twenty years ago.

"This all still seems surreal," said Shackelford. "I am humbled and thankful for this awesome responsibility."

It is also fitting that Shackelford will be at the helm of leading the organization, as the NUL Annual Conference will be returning to his hometown of Houston in 2020.

Shackelford was born and raised in Houston's Third Ward, where he spent his

entire childhood attending Wheeler Avenue Baptist Church. After graduating from Lamar High School, he left Houston to attend Morehouse College, where he graduated cum laude with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Business Administration, concentrating in Finance.

Upon returning to Houston, Shackelford became a member of the Houston Area Urban League for Young Professionals (HAU-LYP) and was eventually elected to serve as its President

As President, he steered HAULYP to an intense focus on service program-

ming and connecting with the community. His impact in that role led to him being named as the National President of the Year. Shackelford went on to serve as Southern Region Vice President of NULYP before recently being elected to serve as the 10th National President.

Recognized as a leader in his community, Shackelford was nominated by the Mayor of Houston and confirmed by the Houston City Council to serve on the city's Independent Police Oversight Board (IPOB), making him one of the youngest members to serve

During the recent six years, Dallasites have had the opportunity to witness firsthand social justice battles throughout the city involving police interactions. Most of these interactions have had tragic endings where innocents have been harmed

Instead of going directly to the dinner, I was asked to stop at a church for a wake.

My brother who I grew up with, Marcellus, lost his son, Marcellus, Jr., who was on his way to college in just two days.

Marcellus Jr. was one of the 13 that were shot, and of the nine who were murdered, in last 10 days. I went to the church and saw Marcellus Sr. and I thought

of images of him in our childhood.

We hugged the same way I hugged the brothers, the sisters, and the mother of

Only with him, I started to cry. I was home. It was my Hollis family and we were hurting.

They, especially the father and the uncle, helped the whole thing to hit home harder. The way it should.

It reminded me that this wake was not business as usual, but instead it was critical for my own spiritual survival and growth.

We had planned the dinner over a month ago, but the murders and the funerals we couldn't have predicted.

At the dinner, we recommitted to work on lifting our community.

We reaffirmed our love for each other and our

I promise to donate more and support more than I have in the past. The time is now what will you do?

## **At-home blood pressure tests more accurate for African Americans**

Cardiologists know that when patients use a blood pressure cuff at home, they have a significant head start on managing their heart health risk. Now, researchers have learned the added value for African Americans.

According to the American Heart Association, African Americans have the highest rates of disability and death related to high blood pressure of any group in the United States.

Researchers at UT Southwestern Medical Center studied data from the Dallas Heart Study and learned that at-home measurements are more accurate, less expensive, and easier to obtain than blood pressure screenings done in medical set-

tings. Patients' readings tend to be higher in the clinic due to stress or anxiety.

"Our study shows that African American men and women who are taking medications to control their hypertension should monitor their blood pressure at

home on a regular basis. These home-taken readings are a more accurate measure of how healthy the heart is than clinic readings when compared to other ethnic groups," said Dr. Wanpen Vongpatanasin, Professor of Internal Medicine, at UT

Southwestern and Director of the Hypertension Section and its Hypertension Fellowship Program.

Checking blood pressure in the clinic alone may miss the opportunity to prevent heart disease, especially in high-risk hypertensive black patients, she added.

The risks are substantial. Having hypertension can potentially lead to heart failure, stroke, kidney failure, and premature death.

"The debate among cardiologists has been whether measuring blood pressure in the clinic can lead to undertreatment or over-treatment of hypertension," said Dr. Vongpatanasin. "We wanted to see if measuring blood pressure at home would give us a more accurate picture of creatic cancer in 2018. Dr. heart health "

The research team assessed 1,262 black and 927 white participants ages 30-64 years. At-home blood pressure measurements were found to be more likely to predict potentially dangerous thickening of the left heart chamber than blood pressure taken at the doctor's office

The study, published in the journal Hypertension, is one of the few to examine an at-home approach to blood pressure monitoring in African Americans.

It was led by prominent hypertension expert and former UT Southwestern Cardiologist Dr. Ron Victor, who lost his battle with pan-

Victor was a co-founder of the Dallas Heart Study who became widely known for his heart disease outreach to African American men through community barbershop visits.

"The Dallas Heart Study is one of the nation's first major population studies designed to focus on the specific heart disease issues of African Americans," Dr. Haley said. "The idea arose from Dr Victor's concerns over the disproportionate numbers of young black men and women with advanced heart disease that he treated over the years. Although long recognized, he felt the causes and solutions of their disease were not being addressed."

## Garland child receives life-saving pancreas transplant, more help needed

With the cost of a lifesaving transplant often exceeding \$800,000, most transplant families are unable to shoulder that financial burden. The Children's Organ Transplant Association (COTA) is a national 501(c)3 charity dedicated to organizing and guiding communities in raising

funds for transplant-related expenses. In Garland, volunteers are raising funds for COTA in honor of transplant patients like a local child from Garlnd, Sophieya Grant.

Sophieya is the daughter of Shirlane and Shane Grant. Born in 2009, Sophieya was diagnosed with

Chronic Pancreatitis. Because of the severity of Sophieva's pancreatitis, the family was required to travel to Cincinnati so the surgery could be performed quickly. The transplant team at Cincinnati Children's Hospital in Cincinnati, Ohio, performed a total pancreatectomy and

islet autotransplantation on Sept.12. Garland volunteers are raising \$25,000 for COTA to assist with transplant-related expenses.

COTA helps transplant families to avoid financial devastation. Transplant procedure costs range from \$100,000 to more than \$800,000. Once the transplant is complete, families face significant transplant-

related expenses, including medication; transportation to and from the transplant center; lodging; and expenses while parents are out of work and often living with the hospitalized child far from home.

These out-of-pocket ex-

#### for an incurable, deadly kidney disease treatment promising

A potential treatment for polycystic kidney disease - a genetic disorder that causes the kidneys to swell with multiple cysts and can eventually lead to organ failure – has shown promising results in animal testing.

A study describing the drug's development and testing appears today in Nature Communications. The study shows an approximately 50 percent reduction in kidney size in afflicted mice following treatment. The drug is now in early clinical trials in human subjects, said Dr. Vishal Patel, Associate Professor of Internal Medicine at UT Southwestern and senior author of the study.

Autosomal dominant polycystic kidney disease (ADPKD) affects about 12

million people worldwide, with half developing endstage kidney disease by age 60, according to the study. "Once the kidneys have failed, the only options for survival are dialysis or a kidney transplant," Dr. Patel said. "A large percentage of ADPKD patients on dialysis die each year while waiting for a donated kidney."

The only drug currently

approved to treat ADPKD, called Jynarque (generic name tolvaptan), carries the FDA's highest warning in its prescribing information, a box notifying prescribers and users of the possibility of "serious and potentially fatal liver injury."

The new treatment cooperatively developed at UT Southwestern and Regulus Therapeutics Inc., a biopharmaceutical company based in California, showed no evidence of toxicity in animals or in human cell tests, according to the study.

It is preferentially delivered to kidneys rather than the liver after being administered, according to the Nature Communications study.

## Scam Alert: Social Security is not trying to take your benefits

We've seen a new twist on the Social Security Administration (SSA) scam recently. There is a SSA imposter robocall, which says your benefits will end. (That's not true, by the way.)

If you get a call like this, do not press 1. Instead, just hang up and remember:

• Your Social Security card. number is not about to be suspended.

• The real Social Security Administration will never call to threaten your ben-

• The real SSA will never tell vou to wire money, send cash, or put money on a gift

The Social Security Administration scam is the number one scam reported to the FTC right now. People filed nearly 73,000 reports about Social Security imposters in the first six months of 2019, with reported losses of \$17 million. (You can ex-

plore the data about imposter scams and losses at ftc. gov/exploredata.)

So if you're getting these calls, you're not alone. Tell your friends and neighbors about this scam. Tell them to hang up the phone. And then to report it to the Federal Trade Commission.

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# Former Dallas Cowboy accused of staging a hate crime in a faked burglary

A former NFL journeyman player for the Dallas Cowboys and Washington Redskins and four other teams, Edawn Louis Coughman, is facing charges after being accused of faking a hate crime and robbing his own business.

The police received a phone tip of a possible burglary in progress on Wednesday, Sept. 11. When they arrived in the area, they pulled over a black truck

which did not have a license plate and discovered Coughman was the driver. A search of his truck uncovered several flat-screen TVs.

Then when the police visited his restaurant, walls were painted with grafitti which included racial slurs such as "monkey" and the N-word. Of course for good measure MAGA was thrown in. The paint appeared to be fresh to them, and Coughman's hands contained fresh

black spray paint.

The Root quoted the Gwinnett County Police's statement, "It appears as though Edawn conjured a premeditated plan to damage his own property, attempt to make it appear as a hate crime, file a claim with his insurance company, and sell off the undamaged appliances and electronics."

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Supposedly, although he

had not called the police, Coughman had already reported the incident to the insurance company. His vehicle was impounded and Thursday Coughman was arrested. Not a new experience for him as he apparently has a long rap sheet.

Released on bond, Coughman is now facing three charges: insurance fraud, making a false report and for removing his license plate.

on that board in the city's history.

In this role, Shackelford reviews investigations conducted by the Houston Police Department's Internal Affairs Division when officers use force on civilians or discharge their firearms.

After reviewing those cases, Shackelford and his peers make recommendations to the Mayor, Chief of Police, and the Public Safety representative for City Council.

Not only is Shackelford an Eagle Scout, he is also a proud member of the Rho Beta Beta Chapter of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., as well as a graduate of the Houston Black Leadership Institute Class II, National Urban League Emerging Leaders Class VII, National Urban League Advocacy Certificate Program, Acceler8 Cohort 3, United Way Project Blueprint Class XXXV, and Leadership Houston Class XXXVII.

He is also the proud father of a nine-year old daughter, Jordan. While maintaining significant commitment to his community, Shackelford has also excelled in his professional life. He holds a Master of Business Administration from the University of Houston and previously worked for the Houston Area Urban League in its Housing Programs department and as a certified housing counselor for the Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing Program.

In both roles, Shackelford worked to solve housing issues facing disadvantaged communities. He is currently working on a major Census 2020 project to ensure an accurate count for African Americans in the upcoming year.

Shackelford understands that he must gain the trust and respect of all members, especially those who did not vote for him, but he is overly optimistic that the organization can thrive with collective unity and focus on advancing the movement.

"Just like I didn't get here on my own, moving forward the same will be true," said Shackelford. "In the coming months my team and I look forward to meeting with the members across the country and hearing their ideas of how we can work together to advance the movement. It will take all of us to create the impact that we want to see, and our communities desperately need."

Shackelford ran on a presidential platform that focused on the following:

- Connecting with the community on a more grass-roots level and bringing together corporations, elected officials, entrepreneurs, unions, the faith community and all other concerned parties for the benefit of the people they serve.
- Creating a "family-feel" environment that with an emphasis on support and accountability as the organization moves toward the common goal of positive impact in our communities, in that wherever a YP member travels to a place where they have a presence in that city they should be able to connect with other YPs.
- Ensuring that the NU-LYP Executive Leadership Team (ELT) sets the tone and the example for chapters across the country, by modeling the same expectations they have of the leaders and chapters they sup-

port

- Being open to receive feedback and listening intently to collect and consider all recommendations.
- Setting clear expectations for how they will operate internally and being transparent by sharing that information with the overall body.
- Responding to communications and requests within 48 hours.
- Strongly encouraging all ELT members to remain active in the movement by participating in local chapter events and supporting NULYP Programming.
- Working with each chapter on how to best align efforts with Affiliate programming
- Having a year-round fundraising focus, targeting national corporate partners that will provide funding to local chapters.
- Instituting a National Giving Tuesday Effort
- YP Next Urban League College Program or Auxiliary, which will give the organization an opportunity to reestablish their presence on college campuses across the country.
- The Whitney Initiative

- Part One: Work with corporate partners to encourage existing Black employee resource groups (BERG) to join NULYP and the development of BERG's where applicable. Part Two: Have conversations with corporations about diversity within their recruitment efforts. Part Three: Encourage Tech and high skill companies to invest in low-income neighborhoods to help close the skill gap.
- National Black Leadership Forum Organize an annual meeting to discuss issues facing our community in conjunction with other national organizations to identify areas for collaboration and action plans.
- Develop a solid Strategic Plan to continually assess their trajectory and adjust course where needed for the betterment of NU-LYP and the communities they serve.

Shackelford knows it will take a lot of hard work to accomplish those goals, but he believes the current climate in this country as it relates to African Americans won't allow him to be deterred from his mission to better the organization.

"Today we live in a nation where Black lives have little to no value, mass shootings have become the norm, children are being stripped from their families, women cannot receive equal pay, and a host of other issues. So, what does that mean for you and I?" asks Shackelford. "We must achieve record voter turnout in both presidential and local elections. We must ensure that every soul is counted in the census. We must become the best version of ourselves and we must come together as a family. We are necessary. We are needed and we must all step up to lead now. The time is now, and this is too important of a time to have a seat on the sidelines."

ordinary girl from Detroit," Windham said. "If I can do it, you can do it too."

The UAW's Ray Curry addressed attendees, applauding the Black Press and reminding the audience of the role that unions have played in America's civil rights struggles. He also shared some of his own history as a beneficiary of benefits gained through the labor negotiation process.

An NNPA and UAW resolution reads, "Whether it was hosting Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. as he wrote his historic 'I Have a Dream' speech in Solidarity House, or providing bail for Dr. King's 1963 release from Birmingham City Jail, the women and men of the UAW have and continue to play a historic role in our

nation's civil rights movement.

"I'm truly honored and humbled to be recognized with such a distinguished award," said Shani W. Hosten, Vice President Multicultural Leadership with AARP. "I also want to recognize the outstanding legacy of the Black Press; I grew up reading the Richmond Free Press and the Richmond Afro; they were staples in our home, around our community, and in our church. Those stories told our stories, and I thank the Black Press for the continued partnership with AARP, and for 192 years of telling our story in our community which is so critical now more than ever," Hosten said





## With injuries, Cowboys rely on new weapons against Dolphins

FRISCO – Now that they've built a 2-0 record and appear invincible each time they take the field, the Dallas Cowboys' world has been infiltrated by the injury bug.

Four of the Cowboys' starters are currently on the mend, and two of them may miss Sunday's 12 noon home game against the Miami Dolphins at AT&T Stadium. The injuries involve wide receiver Michael Gallup, safety Xavier Woods, defensive tackle Tyrone Crawford and nose tackle Antwaun Woods.

Gallup, who leads the team with 13 receptions, will be sidelined two-to-four weeks after undergoing arthroscopic surgery on Tuesday to repair a torn left meniscus. Xavier Woods is



out four-to-six weeks while dealing with a high ankle sprain.

Meanwhile, both Crawford (hip) and Antwaun Woods (sprained knee) are listed as day-to-day. Crawford aggravated his hip during Sunday's 31-21 road win against the Washington Redskins.

While the four injuries are something for the Cowboys to worry about, at least in Gallup's case

they already have someone ready to step in and offer some assistance with the team possibly not missing a beat.

During the win over the Redskins, Devin Smith caught three passes for 74 yards, including a long 51-yard scoring strike from quarterback Dak Prescott. Smith's performance was very meaningful since he has overcome two torn anterior cruciate ligaments and was so beat up that he didn't even play football last season.

"That play -- the big long touchdown -- was a huge play in the game," coach Jason Garrett said. "It kind of shifted the momentum of the game and got us going a little bit on both sides of the ball."

Wide receiver Amari Cooper believes the Cowboys will be in good hands with Smith, who teamed with Ezekiel Elliott at Ohio State to defeat Cooper's Alabama team en route to capturing the 2015 national title.

"I played him my last year at 'Bama when he was at Ohio State and that's what he was doing to us," Cooper said. "I know what he's capable of and it's nice to see him be able to do that in a Cowboy uniform."

Smith is more than ready and able to fill Gallup's shoes.

"When I got this call to be with this team, I just tried to take advantage of every opportunity that I was given," he said. "And here I am now standing in front of all these cameras."

Smith provides another capable target for Prescott, who threw three touchdown passes against the Redskins and now has seven TD

passes this season. The last Cowboys quarterback with seven touchdown passes in the opening two games of the season was Don Meredith back in 1966.

Prescott was on such an incredible roll against the Redskins that at one point he tossed 18 straight passes without an incompletion.

"You're not really aware of it, but again you kind of take it and say, "Man, what's the last incompletion,' Prescott said. "But it's not something you think about.

"It's just about being in a groove, the offense working together. The run game is happening, we're able to throw the ball, receivers are making great catches and you just look up and it's like that."

In addition to beating the Redskins with his arm, Prescott also produced a pivotal 42-yard run that set up another touchdown before he was corralled by Josh Norman.

"I told him if he would have just kept running he might have scored," said Elliott, who rushed for 111 yards on 23 carries and scored a TD against Washington. "Dak's always phenomenal with his arms and with his legs.

"That's what so special about him is he can do both."

It was the longest run of his career by Prescott, who was criticized by Norman the week prior to last Sunday's game for not being a very effective quarterback.

"I heard it, but I'm not going to allow him to be a motivation to me," said Prescott, who was 26-of-30 for 269 yards against the

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
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## Black Communities a key focus in \$2 million Census grant

AUSTIN – This year, the Hogg Foundation for Mental Health is celebrating 80 years of supporting the mental health and wellbeing of Texans. As part of their anniversary efforts, the foundation is accepting proposals for the Texas Communities Count initiative, which will support complete count efforts in Texas for the 2020 U.S. Census. The foundation plans to award grants totaling \$2 million.

The primary focus is to aid collaborative approaches that aim to reach traditionally hard-to-count (HTC) populations, communities and geographic areas throughout the state. The goal is to promote active participation in the 2020 Census so that every person in Texas is counted.

Without a complete count during the 2020 Census, Texas will face unprecedented challenges, losing

both resources and representation for at least a decade. An accurate and complete census is necessary to determine fair allocation of federal dollars for resources, services and infrastructure that support our every-day quality of life.

The African American community has been historically undercounted in the census. The Census Bureau estimates that African Americans were un-

dercounted by more than 800,000 in the 2010 U.S. Census, and that approximately 7 percent of young African American children were overlooked by the 2010 Census, roughly twice the rate for young non-Hispanic white children. This legacy of undercounting has had a negative impact on African American communities and furthers inequities.

"An undercount of Texas"

population by even onepercent could result in a \$300 million loss in federal funding, and 25 percent of Texans—over 6 million people—live in hard-tocount neighborhoods," said Dr. Octavio N. Martinez, Jr., executive director of the Hogg Foundation and senior associate vice president for diversity and community engagement at The University of Texas at Austin. "So the stakes, particularly for African Americans and other historically excluded communities, couldn't be higher."

The foundation seeks proposals that support (1) direct, local, on-the-ground complete count efforts or (2) statewide coordination of these local efforts. Preference will be given to strategies that focus on HTC populations and communities or

said.

civic work, Boykin-Towns said she was able to leverage her experiences to enhance her ability to add value to various spaces.

For the past five years, hundreds of young Muslim men and women have enjoyed weekly programs every Friday night throughout Dallas. There is a standout moment of cinematography when the suspect is being interviewed by the police. The shot is not edited to jump from facial shots of one police detective to the other, it simply glides through the scene seamlessly.

"The camera is a character in every film I do," Johnson stated. Even later in the movie, the camera walks the viewer through the crime scene.

This is his third project with cinematographer Cordell D. Franklin. "I go into every film with a book full of notes, but I also leave room for creativity,"

Johnson added the scene was done in one take.

Sheran Goodspeed Keyton is an associate producer for the film, working with her producing partner Charles W. Bush. A well-known fixture in the Dallas filmmaking community, Bush brought Keyton into this project because they needed, "a really good production scout and other production work," according to Keyton.

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
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## NDG Book Review: More to Life is one to share

"Keep this to yourself!"
That's the way big dreams start: don't tell anyone, because telling makes them more delicate. Sharing makes it hurt more when what you want doesn't happen. As in the new book "More to Life" by ReShonda Tate Billingsley, it's even worse when your dreams are ignored.

Even by her own admission, Aja James had everything a woman could want: a handsome husband, Charles, who loved giving gifts. Two wonderful children. A beautiful home, fine



furnishings, a full closet, a new car.

And yet, during an Islands birthday vacation with her three best friends – paid for by Charles, of course – forty-five-year-old Aja realized that she never had what her soul needed.

Once, she'd showed promise as a painter and it was her passion. She was good at it but, as she realized at the island resort, nobody listened when she said she wanted to paint forever. Her high school guidance counselor and her parents shooed her away from it. Her husband and children called it "a hobby." When Aja said she wanted to open an art gallery, her friends didn't take her seriously, either.

So, like the good wife she was expected to be, she put her own needs aside to take care of Charles and the children. She painted when she could, which was rare because her time was spent looking for lost socks and lost golf clubs and doing what her family demanded of her.

And then Aja met a strange Island woman who told her that she needed to walk her own purpose, words that struck her to the core. Finally, Aja knew what made her feel so unsettled, and she went home to face her future.

But was it with – or without – Charles? Aja's best friends thought she was crazy to give up a good man for the unknown. And the house and the lifestyle, too? Insane! Ah, but just thinking about a quiet art gallery and an easel made Aja smile.

Could she really do it?

Dreams deferred. Is that the story of your very existence? If so, then you'll love having "More to Life"... more or less.

More, because author Re-Shonda Tate Billingsley offers fans another novel that reads as though she's spent a month spying on their lives and calendars, and anyone who's ever lost a dream or shelved one indefinitely will feel a kinship with Aja. That character, as well as the rest of Billingsley's cast, feels familiar, almost personal, and mostly likeable, although the situations they're placed in (here's the "less") are really too over-the-top. Suffice it to say that there's a Big Event inside this tale that abruptly alters the entire course of the story, adding unnecessary drama to a situation that was arguably better and more relatable without embellishment.

Still, if a dream is like a butterfly in your hands, or if you've ever moved to seize a what-if, then this book will read like a diary for you. Start "More to Life" and you won't be able to keep it to yourself.

geographic regions in Texas that are designated as health professional shortage areas.

Hard-to-count populations are defined as persons who typically do not get captured by census data, according to the Census Bureau's research. Examples are children under the age of five, highly mobile people, racial and ethnic minorities, non-English speakers, lowincome and persons experiencing homelessness, and undocumented immigrants. People with mental health conditions are also a HTC population. A useful guide to HTC populations can be found here.

"Due to the fact that many of the hard-to-count popula-

tions live in health professional shortage areas in Texas, federal funding is even more paramount to closing the gap of what health care is available to support wellbeing and mental health" said Emily Bhandari, strategic learning and evalua-

tion program officer for the Hogg Foundation.

In addition to ensuring an accurate count, this initiative is also an opportunity to promote new forms of community collaboration and civic engagement that yield benefits for Texans over the

long-term.
