The overcrowded Democratic presidential field has a record six women seeking the nomination.

But one prominent individual who isn't running for the top job has thrown her hat into the ring for vice president.

Former Georgia Gubernatorial Candidate Stacey Abrams said she would be delighted to serve under one of the 22 candidates.

"I would be honored to be considered by any nominee," Abrams told The New York Times on Wednesday, Aug. 14.

"I've just come to the decision that my best value add, the strongest contribution I can give to this primary, would be to make sure our nominee is coming into an environment where there are strong voter protections in place," Abrams told the Times.

"I would not have publicly raised the possibility if it was not a legitimate thought," Abrams said.

She said the current field, which includes former Vice President Joe Biden: Calif. Sen. Kamala Harris: New Jersey Sen. Cory Booker; and Vermont Sen. Bernie Sanders, is talented

# Another Black man targeted, tasered and beaten by police

Police brutality...Will it ever end?

All eyes across the nation have been on the city of Baytown, Texas, ever since an unarmed Black woman, 44-year-old Pamela Turner, was shot to death on video by Baytown Police Officer Juan Delacruz back on May 13, outside of her apartment complex on Garth Rd. in Baytown.

Since the incident, no charges have been filed against the officer, although the killing was squarely caught on video. Nothing has been done about the police killing of Turner since that time, except that Officer Delacruz returned back to work after being on paid leave for three days.

Fast forward a few months later, and another high-profiled incident was also caught on camera, not too far from where Pamela Turner was fatally shot at close range by Officer Delacruz.

Slightly before midnight on the evening of July 6th, an unarmed Black man, Kedrick Crawford, 45, is seen on camera being unsuspectingly and undeservedly assaulted by Baytown Police officers that left him having to be treated at Ben Taub Hospital for significant injuries to his face, chest, right eye, head and hands.

Crawford states that he pulled into a local H-E-B parking lot on Garth Rd. to put an address into his GPS navigation app to get directions on his cell phone. As he was parked, he states that Baytown Police officers pulled up and approached his vehicle. After being confronted and questioned by police after claims that he looked suspicious while sitting in his parked vehicle, Crawford says that he gave police permission to search his vehicle upon their request.

In the video, released by the Baytown Police department and obtained from the dash cam video of one of the officers, you can hear Crawford tell the officer that he had insurance and whatever else they needed to verify his identity and legitimacy, to which the officer is heard on camera responding, "And what does that have to do with anything?"

After the officers' response, Crawford then asks the officer, "So when am I free to go?" to which the officer responds, "Whenever man!"

Crawford then asks a clarifying question to confirm that the officer told him that he was free to go whenever he wanted to, and as he continues to look on in confusion as to why he was stopped, five seconds later, the officer who told him he was free to go, comes up behind him and commands him to "put your hands behind your back."

The officer, seemingly hostile, sternly notifies Crawford not to resist and emphatically makes a threatening statement saying, "I will drop you!"

According to a statement released by the Baytown Police Department, officials described the encounter as justified, proclaiming that Crawford's "demeanor changes as he becomes increasingly nervous even though officers are being polite and cordial."

In looking at this disturbing video footage, it is clear that Crawford is visibly confused and extremely unaware of why he is being treated this way by the officers.

Crawford then is seen on the video continuously asking the officers "What is going on?" until out of nowhere the officer is heard screaming out that he is about to use the Taser on him.

In the video, you hear Crawford screaming and emphatically crying out that he was going to get killed, while continuing to profess his innocence, along with a plea to the officers to be told exactly what he did wrong.

One of the most shocking things about the video foot-

age, is when a third party in civilian clothing (blue shirt and blue jeans) is seen on the video appearing to place Crawford in a chokehold while wrestling with him on the ground.

The Baytown Police officers do nothing to stop this individual from physically interacting with Crawford, nor do they identify the person in the video as being a member of law enforcement. To date, that person's identity has not been publicly disclosed

After a few minutes of Crawford being tasered and beaten, the officer's body camera goes dark, where at this point, all you can hear is audio of him continuing to scream and demand answers.

After the incident, Crawford reached out to nationally-recognized civil rights attorney Benjamin Crump to take on his case. Crump is already representing the family of Pamela Turner.

"We are here to make this plea and this demand, that this pattern of abuse by the Baytown Police Department on minorities must cease immediately," said Crump. "Baytown, you cannot continue to attack American citizens just because of the color of their skin."

According to a released statement by the Baytown Police Department, they state that, "at one point the officer searching the vehicle locates several small pieces of plastic bag, each of which contained several pills. Recognizing this to be consistent with narcotics packaged for sale, officers attempted to place Mr. Crawford in handcuffs at which time Mr. Crawford began resisting by pulling away from the officer."

Crawford states that the items found in his car were actually antibiotics prescribed to him and not drugs for sale. Crump states that Baytown Police Department has not provided any proof of their claims to justify the instantaneous ramped up attack on Crawford.

"Remember, he (Craw-

ford) committed no crime," said Crump. "So the question is, how can you justify doing him (Crawford) like this after you just told him that he was free to go? It is unjustifiable and they (Baytown Police Department) haven't offered anything to justify that because they cannot."

The Baytown Police Department acknowledged the physical claims brought forth by Crawford in their released statement, saying that "due to Mr. Crawford's persistent resistance, and the fact that the Taser failed to momentarily incapacitate Mr. Crawford, one of the officers delivered a series of elbow strikes and a closed fist strikes to Mr. Crawford's head area in an attempt to disorient him so they could get him into custody."

Crawford was subsequently arrested and charged with aggravated assault on a peace officer, to which the Harris County District Attorney's Office ironically has chosen to accept those charges.

The Baytown Police Department says its Internal Affairs Division is still investigating the incident.

All in all, Crawford states that he is just happy to be alive after seeing many other incidents like his end up with the loss of life, but remains focused on continuing his quest for justice due to the assault committed against him by the Baytown Police officers.

"First of all, I am grateful to God that I'm still alive," said Crawford. "I was, and I am, hurting all over my body. My chest is bruised. My ribs hurt. My face was all messed up. All you have to do is watch the video to see what happened to me. I just don't know why they did this to me."

Both Crump and Crawford are calling on the federal government to look into this matter.

# **Mayor Eric Johnson launches Task Force on Safe Communities**

The death of 9-year-old Brandoniya Bennet last Wednesday, shot while sitting in her East Dallas apartment admiring her back-to-school freshly painted nails, broke the heart of many.

Local and national headlines were filled with the news of how she died when allegedly an Instagram argument between two teens who considered themselves rappers took a tragic turn.

City of Dallas Mayor Eric Johnson stated that because of her death and that of many others, he formed a task force with a described mission of "curbing violence in communities throughout the city."

Earlier that morning on the first day of school for Dallas ISD students, the mayor with his wife and youngest son, together took his oldest son to class for his first day of kindergarten.

"It was not lost on me young Brandoniya should have started school too," the mayor reflected at his afternoon press conference. The Mayor's Task Force entropy of the second sec

on Safe Communities should gain community and stakeholder input; combine this with data to build consensus on next steps. The goal is to stop and prevent violent crime in Dallas without exclusive reliance on law enforcement action.

"I believe in the Dallas Police Department," Mayor Johnson said. "And I believe that the Dallas Police Department's focus on guns, gangs, and drugs is both smart and necessary to help reduce violent crime in our city.

"But we can't ask or expect law enforcement to do it all. To paraphrase one of our former police chiefs, we already ask cops to do too much. Police have to be social workers. They have to deal with mental health and drug addiction and cycles of abuse. And we've asked law enforcement to do all of these things in an environment where illegal guns are far too easy for criminals to obtain."

The mayor is seeking an official report with recommendations by the end of the year.

> Trio selected to lead the task force

To lead the task force, the mayor introduced three cochairs:

• Pastor Michael Bowie, senior pastor at St. Luke Community United Methodist Church;

• Rene Martinez, a longtime educator and community activist; and

• Alan Cohen, President & CEO of the Child Poverty Action Lab.

"I'm grateful to all three of these dedicated community leaders for their service," Mayor Johnson said. More members of the

task force are to be named later. The co-chairs did not

speak during the brief City Hall press conference, issuing statements individually to the press.

"Ending this scourge of violence will start with taking steps in our communities and being willing to carry each other's burdens. The work ahead will be challenging, but I am confident the collective wisdom and spirit of this task force will serve this city well," Pastor Michael Bowie stated.

"I have seen over many years the ups and downs of crime in Dallas over many decades. I have always tried to be part of the solution. In my lifetime of community public service and leadership, I have learned how much we can accomplish when we unite around a cause. So I'm honored that the mayor has asked me to once again serve my community by helping make Dallas a safer place to live in," Rene Martinez said.

"I am honored that Mayor Johnson has asked me to co-chair this Task Force. To achieve lasting impact on issues as complex as crime and public safety, I believe strongly in taking an inclusive approach that combines the use of datadriven insights with the lived experience of community members. So I look forward to hearing from citizens and stakeholders seeking actionable solutions to improve safety for all Dallas residents," Alan Cohen shared.

Recent deadly headlines

Shortly before Mayor Johnson's June election, Dallas witnessed 41 murders during the month of May. As a result, Governor Gregg Abbott sent Texas State Troopers to the city to help support the efforts of a short-staffed Dallas Police Department.

The involvement of the Troopers has been a subject of debate in the Southern Dallas community. Recently, City Councilman Adam Bazaldua at the request of residents in District 7, called for their removal. In about seven weeks, they claimed to have between 9,000 - 12,000 traffic stops, which resulted in the dis-

covery of 70 illegal guns, and hundreds of arrests.

**Community** 

Over the weekend, the Troopers shot and killed a suspect who reportedly aimed a gun at them after resisting their attempts to pull him over for a traffic violation.

The formation of the task force follows daily headlines for nearly a week filled with announcements of more shooting murder victims.

In addition to the death of young Brand Thursday, Christopher Whitfield Johnson, the son of Dallas ISD Trustee for District 5, Maxie Johnson died following an overnight shooting.

# Dak Prescott impressive in preseason win over Rams

Another preseason game netted another perfect outing for Dallas Cowboys quarterback Dak Prescott.

A week after completing all four of his passes during a loss to the San Francisco 49ers, Prescott was 5-of-5 for 64 yards this past Saturday in helping the Cowboys to a 14-10 victory over the Los Angeles Rams in a game played in Honolulu, Hawaii.

The Cowboys (1-1) will return to the field on Saturday at 6 p.m. when they host their home preseason opener against the Houston Texans at AT&T Stadium in Arlington.

Prescott was flat-out brilliant in his only series against the Rams. Starting a pulsating drive at the Dallas 3-yard line, the fourth-year veteran marched the Cowboys 97 yards to paydirt, with the 12-play excursion climaxed by a 14-yard touchdown scamper from rookie running back Tony Pollard.

Needless to say, coach Jason Garrett was more than pleased to watch Prescott engineer a drive – from the shadows of his own end zone — which consumed more than six minutes.

"It's always a challenge coming off your own goal line," Garrett said. "We call that a 'coming out situation.'

"One of your goals is to get a first down and change field position. To be able to have a 12-play drive and cash it in for points was big for us."

Pollard also was big for the Cowboys (again). Subbing for Ezekiel Elliott, who remains a contract holdout, Pollard was very instrumental in the opening TD drive.

Indeed, like Elliott, Pollard has proven that the NFL's bright lights aren't too bright for him at this early juncture of his career.

"Tony is very poised," Garrett said. "He plays with maturity beyond his years.

"We're only a couple of preseason games into it and not a lot of plays into it. But it kind of follows with what we've seen in practice and just how he handles himself."

The game against the Rams was the first for long-time Cowboys tight end Jason Witten since he retired following the 2017 season to pursue a career as a television analyst. Witten caught one pass for 10 yards and felt like he was opening his favorite present son Christmas morning.

"I was very anxious to get out there and play," said Witten, who is in his 17th season with the Cowboys. "It is just the next step in the comeback.

"I worked really hard to get back in shape. I hold myself to a high standard,

so I can say it was not perfect. I got a little antsy early, but had a big third-down conversion on an option route."

As far as the race for the backup quarterback spot goes, Cooper Rush once again out-played Mike White. Rush was 10-of-16 for 83 yards, and also tossed the game-winning touchdown – an 8-yarder to Devin Smith with 1:50 remaining in the third quarter that erased a 10-7 deficit.

White, meanwhile, struggled for the second straight game as he finished 7-of-13 for only 30 yards, and also hurled an interception.

Overall, the Cowboys had 251 total yards, with 94

coming on 24 rushing attempts. They also held the Rams to 270 yards, including just 67 rushing on 22 carries.

Afterward, a lot of the talk centered around the poise and precision Prescott displayed for the second consecutive week.

"It is a small sample size, and we're not going crazy about him being 9-for-9, but what he's done well though is play well," Garrett said. "He's played well in practice, he's played well in preseason games, he's handled himself well, he's making good decisions, making good throws, and that follows with how he prepares."



For payday loan borrowers and consumer and civil rights activists, this Aug. 19 was supposed to be the end of payday lending's nearly inevitable debt trap. No longer would consumers incur seemingly endless strings of loans that lenders knew they could not afford. Nor would lenders have unlimited and automatic direct access to borrower checking accounts; only two debits could be drawn on an account with insufficient funds. The days of unrestrained businesses recklessly selling payday and car-title loans as short-term financial fixes that grew to become long-term debt was set for a shutdown.

Let's say these borrowers were looking forward to financial freedom from the endless cycle of loan renewals and costly fees generated by triple-digit interest rates. In practical terms, the typical, two-week \$350 payday loan winds up costing \$458 in fees.

But just as seasons and circumstances can and do

change, under a different administration, the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau (CFPB) has functioned more recently to help predatory lenders than to fulfill its statutory mission of consumer protection

Last summer, then-CF-PB head Mick Mulvaney, joined the payday loan industry to challenge and win a delay in the implementation of the long-awaited payday rule. Mulvaney also withdrew a lawsuit filed by the CFPB against a payday lender ahead of his arrival.

Months later in a West Texas federal court, U.S. District Judge Lee Yeakel granted a 'stay', the legal term for a court-ordered delay, to allow the current CFPB Director the chance to rewrite the rule adopted under the Bureau's first Director. Even earlier and under Acting CFPB Director Mick Mulvaney, a lawsuit filed by CFPB against a payday lender was withdrawn.

In response to these and other anti-consumer devel-

opments, consumer advocates chose to observe the August 19 date in a different way: reminding CFPB what it was supposed to do on behalf of consumers.

"[S]ince its 2017 leadership change, the CFPB has repeatedly failed to support the August 19, 2019 compliance date the agency established for these important provisions," wrote Americans for Financial Reform Education Fund, National Consumer Law Center, Public Citizen, and the Center for Responsible Lending (CRL). The August 12 joint letter to Director Kraninger called for "timely implementation" of the rule's payment protections. While the CFPB continues to push for a stay of the rule's ability-to-repay requirements, it has failed to offer any basis for its anti-consumer effort.

It took years of multiple public hearings, research, public comments, and a careful rulemaking process before Director Cordray, delivered a rule that would provide financial relief

from one of the nation's most heinous predatory loans.

Similar sentiments were expressed to the CFPB by 25 state attorneys general (AGs) whose jurisdictions included California, Illinois, Maryland, Michigan, New York, North Carolina, Oregon, Virginia, and the District of Columbia. In written comments on CFPB's plan to rewrite the payday rule, these state officials also expressed serious issues with the Bureau's anti-consumer shift.

"T] he Bureau's proposed repeal of the 2017 rule would eliminate an important federal floor that would protect consumers across the country, including from interstate lending activity that is challenging for any individual State to police," wrote the AGs. "Extending credit without reasonably assessing borrowers' ability to repay their loans resembles the poor underwriting practices that fueled the subprime mortgage crisis, which eventually led to an economic tailspin and enactment of the Dodd-Frank Act."

A 2019 CRL research report found that every year, payday and car-title loans drain nearly \$8 billion in fees from consumer pockets. Although 16 states and the District of Columbia have enacted rate caps that limit interest to no more than 36%, 34 states still allow triple-digit interest

rate payday loans that together generate more than \$4 billion in costly fees. Similarly, car-title loans drain more than \$3.8 billion in fees annually from consumers in the 22 states where this type of loan is legal.

Texas leads the nation in costly payday loan fees at \$1.2 billion per year. Overall, consumers stuck in more than 10 payday loans a year represent 75% of all fees charged.

Car-title loan fees take \$356 million out of the pockets of Alabama residents, and \$297 million from Mississippi consumers. And among all borrowers of these loans, one out of every five loses their vehicle to repossession.

This spring before a Capitol Hill hearing, Diane Standaert, a CRL EVP and Director of State Policy summarized the choices now before the nation: "Policymakers have a choice: siding with the vast majority of voters who oppose the payday loan debt trap or siding with predatory lenders charging 300% interest rates."

As Spike Lee advised years ago, "Do the right thing."

# Want employees to love what they do? Four ways to get there

Bosses might want to take notice if employees view their jobs as "the daily grind."

A disgruntled and disengaged workforce can undermine production and harm customer relations, while a happy, engaged workforce does the opposite.

"If you take care of your employees, they will be better prepared and far more motivated to take care of your customers," says Shawn Burcham (www.shawnburcham.com), founder and CEO of PFSbrands and author of Keeping Score with GRITT: Straight Talk Strategies for Success.

"Ideally, you want employees who think and act like owners."

Burcham says one of the first steps toward cultivating such an environment is to communicate openly with employees. And that may be even more crucial today because newer generations entering the workforce want to know the "why" of what they are doing.

"Millennials value truth and honesty," Burcham says. "They also are looking for personal growth, education, and continuous learning. If companies want to scale, then they need to embrace millennials and work to create an environment where they are engaged."

He suggests four ways leaders can help their employees love what they do: • Have fun at work.

People spend more hours at their jobs than doing just about anything else, Burcham says, so the time might as well be enjoyable rather than drudgery. Some simple ways people can have fun at work include cracking jokes, decorating their work areas, or celebrating employee birthdays. For Burcham, the work itself is fun. "As a leader, I want to provide an environment conducive to having fun," he says. "I also let our employees know that it is up to them to make having fun a reality within their job and their department."

• Coach them up. All employees must be willing to learn at a pace consistent with the company's growth,

Burcham says. "Usually, we hire people with a skillset that enables them to scale with us," he says. "Sometimes, though, we have employees who are challenged to 'make the leap' with us. When that happens, we work with them to find a role on our team where they can excel. We want to provide them with every opportunity and tool we can to help them adapt."

• Maintain a positive attitude. Most successful people exude a positive attitude, are optimistic, and have a never-quit personality, Burcham says. "Who wants to work in an environment of doom and gloom?" he asks. One way to cultivate an upbeat workplace is to strive to hire only "A" players, people who want to be the best at their jobs and take pride in making positive contributions. "But anyone can be or become an A player," Burcham says. "It simply revolves around having a positive attitude along with a desire to learn and constantly improve."

• Show appreciation. Employees want to know that the bosses - and their coworkers - appreciate them, so it's important to find ways to show them. Burcham says at his company new hires are welcomed by dozens of emails from their team members before they even arrive for the first day of work. When they start, two or three dozen employees gather to greet them with a high five. "For our team, it's all about gratitude," Burcham says. "It's not, 'I have to go to work today.' It's, 'I get to go to work today.' "

"I think the real key," Burcham says, "is to hire people who are already motivated and then put them in an environment where they can excel. Engaged employees are fun to work with and they will go the extra mile for their customers as well as their peers.

# Tax planning should include a Paycheck Checkup

Year-round tax planning is important for everyone. Just because a taxpayer already filed their tax return doesn't mean they don't need to think about taxes for the rest of the year. In fact, what they do now may affect any tax they might owe next year. It could also affect the refund they expect.

Since federal taxes operate on a pay-as-you-go basis, taxpayers need to pay most of their tax during the year as they earn the income. Taxpayers should make sure they're having the correct amount of tax

withheld from their paychecks. It's a good idea for taxpayers to do a Paycheck Checkup for these reasons:

• Having too little withheld could lead to a smaller than expected refund.

• Having too little withheld could even lead to an unexpected tax bill.

• Employees who have too much tax withheld will see less money in each paycheck. Having more money in each paycheck may be more helpful than getting a large refund when they file.

Taxpayers can use the IRS Tax Withholding Estimator to check their withholding. All taxpayers should use this tool to do a Paycheck Checkup ASAP if they haven't already done so in 2019. Some taxpayers should do another Paycheck Checkup even if they already did one this year. This includes anyone whose personal or financial information changes due to a life event. Some life events that can affect withholding are:

- Marriage · Having a baby
- · Getting a new job
- Getting a raise at work

Not Understand:' Prosocial Motivation, Image Discrepancies, and Proactivity in Public Safety," by Mc-Combs Assistant Professor of Management Shefali V. Patil and R. David Lebel from the University of Pittsburgh, found that officers are less likely to proactively build relationships with community members and help solve their problems if they feel that the public does not understand the difficulties of their jobs.

"In the vast majority of jobs, it is really difficult for other people outside to understand your job, but people don't realize how much this misunderstanding can actually influence the behavior of police officers," Patil said.

The researchers asked 183 police officers across six agencies and 238 firefighters across eight stations in the southern United States about whether they believed the public understood the difficulties of their jobs. The researchers also surveyed the officers' supervisors about their proactivity. The police officers and

firefighters who said the

public did not understand their jobs were significantly less likely to be rated as proactive by their supervisors, even if their reason for doing their jobs is to help others

"When proactive officers see something that's happening in a local neighborhood, they get out of the patrol car and go to help somebody even though they don't need to and nobody's actually watching them," Patil said. "But being less proactive would mean taking a less active role while on a shift and basically only doing what your boss tells you.'





# *NDG* Book Review: *Sandy Feet! Whose Feet? Footprints at the Shore*

It's always a good day when you're at the beach, but in "Sandy Feet! Whose Feet?" by Susan Wood, illustrated by Steliyana Doneva, who else is there with you?

It's sunny, the water's warm, and yay! You're at the beach. The waves are perfect for splashing and the sand is wet in some places and dry in others. Who could resist making all kinds of footprints?

Not the dog, whose fat, furry paws make footprints in the sand. You can see his toe-marks and his clawprints as he runs around and splashes.

A sandpiper is a bird that lives at the beach and he runs back and forth on his quick little legs. He jumps and skips and you can see his toes in the sand, too, but they're very small. The sandpiper's footprints are from little bird feet.



The seagull, another bird, also leaves footprints on the sand.

If you watch over the water, you might see a pelican, as he dives for dinner. He's a hungry guy, ready for a few fishy snacks.

Over there, right at the edge of shore, you can see a footprint that looks like someone dragged their feet. That's the print of the crab, who "scuttles on its way" back to the water. Watch out for his claws! The footprints that look a little like a star are from a starfish who doesn't want to be caught - and that other shufflemark is a turtle who might be ready to make her nest. Baby turtles are the cutest!

Pretty soon, it's the end of the day and almost time to go home - but wait. Look at those long prints with five little round toes. Who do you think made those footprints in the sand? swimsuits and sunscreen are all piled up and ready to go. So are the kids; they're so excited, they can barely sleep and "Sandy Feet! Whose Feet" is the perfect prevacation, before-bedtime treat.

Inside this book, author Susan Wood offers a simple rhyme that's short on words and light on action, and illustrator Steliyana Doneva matches the tone with muted colors in her drawings. That means a quieter, more relaxing story for your little beachcomber, but it's one they'll remember as soon as they hit the sand.

Wood's tale gives kids something to do while it imparts a different sort of lesson: they're subtly challenged here to look for marks in the sand made by the beach's wildlife. More importantly, the children inside this book are respectful of the water and are shown having fun and being safe.

For 4-to-8-year-olds, that's just-right, and "Sandy Feet! Whose Feet?" may help parents make memories. If you're heading to the beach for what's left of summer, step out and get it.
